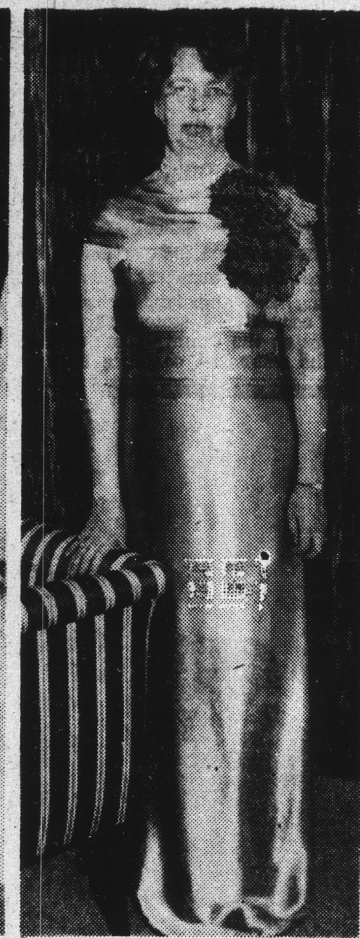
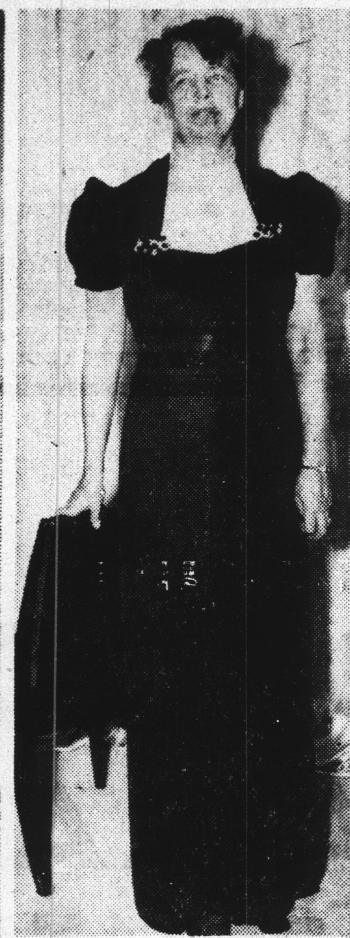


Mrs. Roosevelt Selects Her Winter Wardrobe and Shops Early for Christmas Gifts

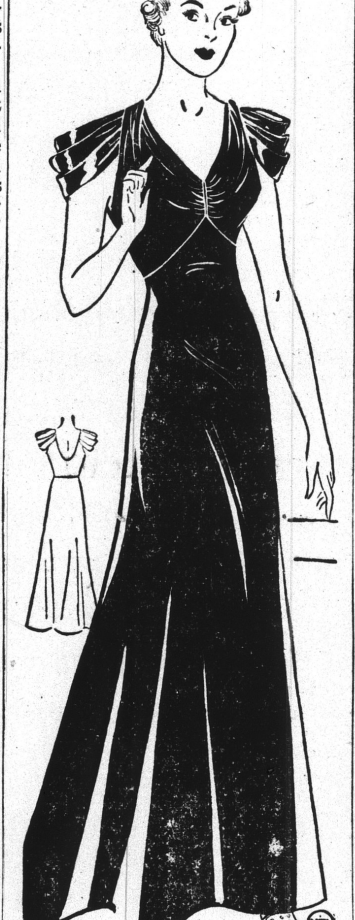
Clawsons Wed 62 Years

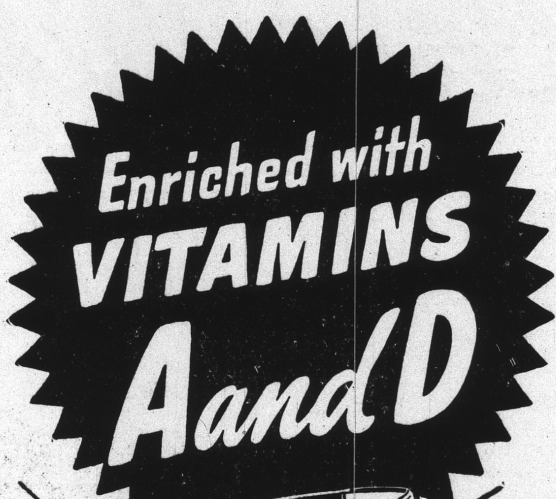

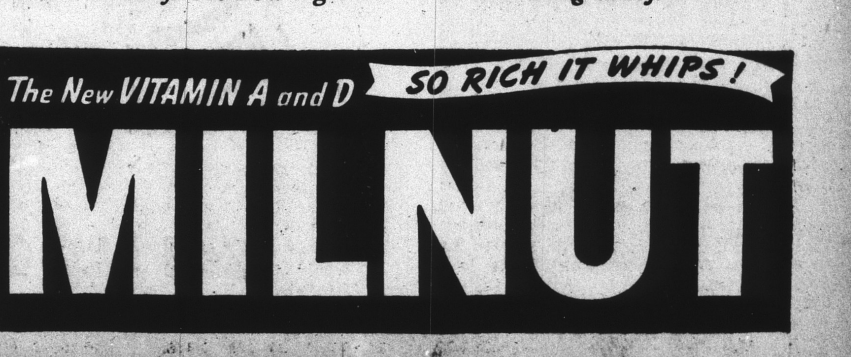
