

STATE LEANS ON
GASOLINE LEVY,
STUDY REVEALS

37 Per Cent of Indiana's
Intake in '38 From
That Source.

Indiana in 1938 was one of only 18 states in the nation which derived better than 35 per cent of all tax revenues from a single source, an analysis, prepared by the Tax Policy League and reported by Editorial Research Reports, revealed today.

Moreover, by raising 37.47 of all taxes from gasoline in 1938 as compared with 31.63 per cent from the same source in 1937, Indiana went contrary to the general trend toward a more balanced taxation, the report said.

Eighteen of the 28 states for which comparative figures were furnished, depended on gasoline along with Indiana as the greatest single revenue producer and four others took a greater percentage of total taxes from that source in 1938 than in 1937.

These states were Mississippi, Montana, Nevada and North Carolina.

7 Depend on 'Gas' in '38

Seven states depended on gasoline for a greater percentage of total taxes in 1938 than in 1937.

In 1937, 25 states derived better than 35 per cent of all their tax revenue from a single source. In 1938, the list was reduced to 18, including North, which got 1.67 per cent of its tax from each of two sources—36.2 per cent from property taxation (36.5 per cent in 1937) and 35.1 per cent from gasoline taxes (34.6 per cent in 1937).

In 1937, 15 states got better than 40 per cent of all revenue from a single source. In 1938, the list was reduced to eight. Illinois and West Virginia continued to yield heavy revenue from sales taxation, and Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi, Nebraska and Tennessee collecting better than 40 per cent of all revenue from gasoline taxation. Even this showing, however, represented a vast improvement over 1937, when Florida, Georgia, Nebraska and Tennessee got better than 50 per cent from gasoline taxes and South Dakota got more than half of all its revenue from special taxes on insurance companies.

Nebraska—Over Half

Nebraska was the only state in the Union which depended upon one tax for more than half its revenue in 1938, collecting 50.1 per cent from gasoline. In South Dakota, the Tax Policy League reports that the yield of insurance taxes dropped last year to 1.8 per cent (dollar volume: \$13,329,032 in 1937 against \$257,460 in 1938), while the proportionate yield of other taxes showed large increases: gasoline from 16.7 per cent to 32.3 per cent; alcoholic beverages, from 3.3 per cent to 9.9 per cent; gross receipts, from 11.9 per cent to 25.9 per cent; severance taxes, from 2.9 per cent to 6.7 per cent, and so on.

The table below shows changes recorded in 1938 as compared with 1937 in the dependence of states upon some single source of revenue. In a few instances where somewhat startling results are shown, the changes seem to have been influenced partly by more accurate segregation of taxes than was possible with the often limited data available in 1937.

Yield Declines

Thus, in Vermont, the yield of gasoline taxes is shown to have declined from 42.9 per cent of all tax revenue in 1937, to 28.3 per cent of the total in 1938. Actually, revenue from motor vehicle registration (plus other highway imposts) appears to have been included in the 1937 figure, and segregated in 1938. Similarly, the low yield of New York State's income tax (10.2 per cent in 1937 to 38.5 per cent in 1938) is due in part to the fact that the state's total income rose from about \$420 million to \$443 million, but a more important factor is that the Tax Policy League divides New York's state system into 14 categories in 1938, against only nine in 1937.

WLW TO SEEK NEW
HEARING ON POWER






