

## ONE OF CARS IN CRASH UPSETS; SIX ARE HURT

Men on Way to Work in Beech Grove Among Victims: 55 Face Court.

(Editorial, Page 22)

Six persons were injured, one seriously, in an automobile crash shortly before 9 a. m. today at South-eastern and Emerson Aves.

As police investigated the crash they reported the arrest of 55 motorists. Twelve overnight accidents were reported.

Fourteen of those arrested were charged with speeding, 18 with running red lights, three with failing to stop for preferential streets, two for reckless driving, one for drunk driving and 17 on other charges. Charles E. Hunsicker, 21, who gave his address as 3646 Roosevelt Ave., the driver and only occupant of one car, received head and possible internal injuries in the crash at Southeastern and Emerson Aves. He was admitted to City Hospital.

Police said he was driving a car owned by Tracey Cox, former boxer.

One Car Waiting for Light

They said the car crashed broad-side into one driven by Chester Duncan, of 2980 N. Chester St., which had stopped for a traffic light, then overturned.

Mr. Duncan was reported hurt, but was not taken to the hospital. Passengers in his car, all of whom were taken to the hospital, were:

Gus Lang, 2871 N. Sherman Drive; Almus Fields, 51, of 2224 N. LaSalle St.; Luther Hartzog, 32, of 3819 E. 32d St.; and James Sanders, 44, of 3921 E. 31st St.

All but Mr. Lang and Mr. Fields were discharged after treatment. Deputy sheriffs said that Mr. Duncan and the passengers in his car were en route to work at railroad shops at Beech Grove.

Five others were hurt in the overnight accidents.

Middletown Woman Hurt

Mrs. Robert Anderson, Middletown, was in St. Vincent's Hospital with possible internal injuries received when a car driven by Lorene Trowbridge, Middletown, collided with a car driven by Day Healy, Cleveland, at 27th and Pennsylvania Sts. Mrs. Gladys Heathcock, 3209 N. Meridian St., also a passenger in the Middletown car, was reported injured slightly.

Bernard Haverkamp, 30, of 5329 E. 10th St., was arrested on a charge of failure to give the right of way to fire apparatus following a collision between his car and Fire Department Pumper No. 7 at 10th and Bellefontaine Sts. Mr. Haverkamp was treated at City Hospital for cuts and bruises.

The pumper and car struck a truck parked at the scene. Abe Rose, 1002 Bellefontaine St., owner of the parked truck, was arrested on a charge of parking in a restricted zone.

Mrs. C. A. Taylor, 3115 Washington Blvd., was treated by a physician for cuts after her car, driven by Miss Dorothy Strauss, same address, collided with two other cars at the intersection of Madison Ave. and Raymond St. Miss Strauss was arrested on a charge of disobeying a traffic signal.

Crash Loses Teeth

Drivers of the other cars were Herschell Webster, North Vernon, and John Sauter, 1413 E. Tabor St. Neither was injured, police said.

W. R. Green, 66 W. New York St., was treated by a private physician for a cut upper lip and several loosened teeth after the taxicab in which he was riding collided with a car at North and Illinois Sts.

Walter E. Henson, 1252 W. Washington St., driver of the cab, and A. H. King, 926 Fairfield Ave., driver of the other car, were said to have been uninjured.

## ARGENTINA PROBES PLOT IN PATAGONIA

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, March 31 (U. P.).—Foreign Minister Jose Maria Cantillo said today that the Government was investigating newspaper reports that Nazi propagandists were trying to induce the people of the Patagonia area to annex themselves to Germany as colonists.

Dr. Cantillo announced the investigation after a conference with President Ortiz. He said they both agreed "to take the necessary steps in defense of the national sovereignty."

Reports of pro-Nazi activity in the southern part of the country and in Buenos Aires Province, circulated mostly by Left Wing newspapers, were climaxed yesterday afternoon when the Noticias Graficas, an independent paper, published a copy of what was called to be a report sent Nov. 1 to German Foreign Ministry by Councillor Carl von Schubert of the German Embassy here and by the acting head of the Nazi Party in Argentina.

This document said: "Patagonia is nobody's land and we are able to annex it." The German Embassy immediately denounced the document as false and was understood to be preparing a communique intended to prove its denial.

WHITE SAYS PRESS AS FREE AS PEOPLE

NEW YORK, March 31 (U. P.).—William Allen White, "Sage of Emporia," writing in Collier's magazine, said today that "the American press is as free as the American people." Our people has the faults of our people and their saving virtues.

The noted Kansas publisher said that the quarrel between Interior Secretary Harold Ickes and Publisher Frank Gannett was based on a "confusion of terms" brought about by the machine age.

"The sad part of it is that they are both right and at the same time each is more or less wrong," Mr. White said.

"The press, theoretically is as free as it was 50 or 100 years ago. The editor can, if he will, say what he pleases and do what he chooses with his press, but in three generations the American press has become properly affected by the security of its profits. It tends by reason of its heavy investment to be increasingly a monopoly. The one paper town is becoming more and more common. Larger and larger towns tolerate gladly the newspaper monopoly for business reasons."

Newspaper still, Mr. White said, are dependent on good will.

LOUISIANA—FINEST SAVED FROM FLAMES

CLEVELAND, March 30 (U. P.).—"Disturbed and embarrassed" by the amount of publicity given the order to burn "Louisiana—the Finest," a publication issued under the Commonwealth's seal, Charles H. Lake, superintendent of schools, countermanded the order today.

His secretary, H. L. Sammons, had ordered 150 of the volumes burned upon discovery that the book, which was to have been distributed to students' libraries in high schools here as reference material, contained several pictures of comely but scantily clad young women.

## WIFE OF HITLER'S BROTHER ARRIVES

NEW YORK, March 31 (U. P.).—Chancellor Hitler's Irish sister-in-law arrived on the Normandie yesterday to enter vaudeville and said she hoped eventually to go to Rome to have her connection with the Hitler family entirely abrogated.

Her son, William, arrived with Mrs. Alois Hitler, who said she was married to Alois, half-brother of the dictator, in Dublin in 1910, but was deserted three years later, when William was two years old. Alois now operates a Berlin restaurant. William said he met his famous uncle several times and was in Germany until last January.

"My uncle offered to get me a job with the Hamburg-American line," he said, "but I told him the salary was too small. I got a job in a bank."

"I finally left Germany because my uncle and his friends were against me. I was told that it was not healthy for me there. 'Everything that makes life worthwhile is gone in Germany.' 'Opinion is divided as to Adolf Hitler's greatness. I think he has created a Frankenstein monster which is marching on and probably will destroy Germany and Hitler himself.'"

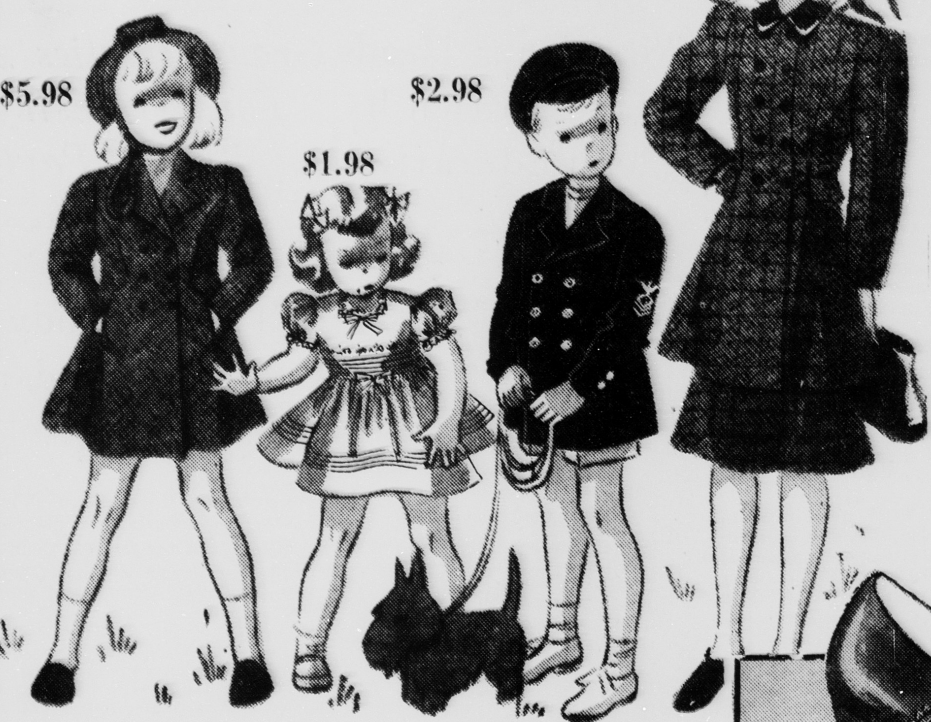
