## Institute to Give Courses for Missionary Society Leaders

Four courses for leaders of missionary societies, adult study groups and younger groups will be offered in the 10th annual Missionary Education Institute beginning May 1 at the Third Christian Church. Dr. George Walker Buckner Jr., editor of The World Call, will give five addresses on "The World Church in the Crisis" at the general assembly meeting during the five-day institute.

Courses will include two for leaders of missionary societies and adult study groups, on "Christ and the World Community: Abroad and At Home"; one for children's leaders dealing with motivation of missions for children, and the fourth for leaders of young people giving help in the use of missionary methods.

### Course Leaders Listed

Mrs. Katharine V. Silverthorn, Philadelphia, will lead the adult course, "Christ and the World Community: Abroad." She is general director of the Department of Missionary Education of the Board of Christian Education of the Presbyterian Church in the United States. The text will be "Through Tragedy to Triumph" (Basil Matthews).

Mrs. E. E. McClintock, Chicago, will be leader of the course dealing with "Christ and the World Community: At Home." She is regional secretary of the Missions Council of the Congregational and Christian Churches and for 10 years was executive secretary of the Denver Council of Religious Education. The text for the course will be "Home and Welcome House" (Jessie Eleanor Moore), "Windows Into Alaska" (Elizabeth Harris) and "Under the North Star" (Katharine E. Gledhill).

Dr. David D. Baker, St. Louis, director of the Co-operative Council of Missionary Education of the Evangelical and Reformed Church, will be leader of the fourth course for leaders of young people. Current texts to be used will include "Right Here at Home" (Frank S. Mead) and "Through Tragedy to Triumph."
