

CITY PREPARES WELCOME FOR RACE VISITORS

Citizens Speedway Group
Will Meet Next Week
To Complete Plans.

The Indianapolis Citizens Speedway Committee's courtesy division is to meet next week to complete "welcoming plans" for race visitors. Paul L. McCord, Chamber of Commerce civic activities vice chairman, said today.

The citizens' committee, established last year, has been reorganized this year with three basic objectives in mind, Mr. McCord said.

"We have organized a promotional committee and responsibility on the part of our citizens: place civic interest behind the giving of lap prizes, and make plans for the annual victory dinner," he said.


