

**STATE PRAISED
BY TOWNSEND
AT N. Y. FAIR**

\$125,000,000 Industrial
Growth in Two-Year
Period Described.

NEW YORK, June 1.—More than
\$125,000,000 in new industry has
located in Indiana during the last
two years, Governor Townsend said
here in an address at the Indiana
Day Program at the World's Fair
today.

Scores of Indiana residents who
came here on a special train yester-
day and former Hoosiers from all
parts of the nation attended the
program.

"Hoosiers want the world to think
of them as good neighbors and good
Americans," the Governor said.
"Our people have used the fertile
soil and natural resources to de-
velop Indiana so that it might con-
tribute to the general progress of
America."

Halls Sound Structure

"Our economy is balanced by
steady industrial development. We
believe we have the soundest ad-
ministrative structure of state gov-
ernment in the United States."

"Our State has no debt and In-
diana was the first state to com-
pletely participate in all phases of
the Social Security program. We
have pioneered in interstate co-op-
eration, the breaking down of trade
barriers in order that we may live in
peace and harmony with our neigh-
bors."

"I like to think of Indiana as a
good place to live. Apparently this
opinion is shared by others for more
than \$125,000,000 of new industry
has located in Indiana within the
last two years," the Governor con-
cluded.

Ewing Also Speaks

Oscar R. Ewing, New York lawyer
who was born in Greenfield, also
spoke. He now is a member of the
law firm of Hughes-Richard-Hub-
bard-Ewing, which was formed by
Supreme Court Chief Justice
Charles Evans Hughes.

Mr. Ewing pointed out the contri-
butions that Indiana has made in
the world of today and those that
it is expected to make in the world
of tomorrow.

The speaker went back to the be-
ginning of settlement in Indiana
and traced the development of the
Hoosier state, showing its relation
to the development of the cultural
and physical aspects of the entire
country.

"No matter how far from home
her sons and daughters may roam,
no matter how sincere may be their
attachments to their adopted states,
always dear down in their hearts is
that mystical tie binding them to
the one spot on earth which alone
can satisfy their hungry souls—Indi-
ana," Mr. Ewing said.

of the World's Fair 1939" which was
being held in the Cuban Village con-
cession. He was in the audience
with several deputies.

The girls were taken to the office
of the concession, where they were
identified as Lois de Fee, 6 foot 2
feet girl who is the queen of the
Amazon Village concession; Ann
Wilson of the Cavalcade of Cen-
taurs; Marge Berk of the Frozen

Alive show, and Jane Dolores of the
Cuban Village.

In the office Sheriff Fitzgerald de-
cided that Miss de Fee and Miss
Wilson had worn "adequate cloth-
ing" and no charges should be
made against them.

Miss Berk and Miss Dolores, after
putting on clothing, were placed in
autos and taken to the World's
Fair precinct station house where
they were charged with indecent
