

PUPIL IS INJURED WHEN STRUCK BY CAR NEAR HOME

Only Two Others Are Hurt
As Overnight Accidents
Decline to Seven.

John E. Miller, 11-year-old school pupil, escaped with a slight injury to his left arm when struck by an automobile yesterday. He was treated at City Hospital and sent home.

Police said that he ran across the street near his home, 1222 S. West St., and was struck by a car driven by Patrick Fortney, of Olney Ill.

52 Drivers Held

Only two other persons were hurt as the number of overnight traffic accidents here dropped to seven. Police arrested 52 motorists.

Joseph Naton, 55, of 573 N. Tacoma Ave., received a possible skull fracture when he walked into the side of a car driven by Fred E. Hager, 1838 Brookside Ave., on Massachusetts Ave., 1300 block, police said. Naton was treated at City Hospital.

Investigate Alleged Student Detention

Police Chief Morrissey today investigated a report made on behalf of an Indiana University student that he was held in the City Jail for 26 hours after he was arrested here recently for double-parking.

The report, made in a letter from Edward C. Collier, Mayor of Martinsville, to the Safety Board yesterday, was turned over to the Chief. He is to report back to the Board next Tuesday.

Mr. Collier complained that the student, Mark M. Meyers, of Martinsville, was arrested for double-parking downtown, was taken to the police station in a patrol wagon and refused permission to telephone his parents.

He was charged with improper parking and failure to have a driver's license, and was released after his trial, 26 hours later, the Martinsville Mayor said. The student was fingerprinted and placed in the police lineup, too, he added.

Chief Morrissey explained to the Safety Board that it was routine to take fingerprints and place in the lineup anyone who had been held in the jail for 24 hours.

ABC to Open Two-Way Beer Inquiry

Two investigations were started by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission today.

One followed charges made to Governor Townsend that a district representative of the Beverage Commission was a partner in a beer business in Muncie.

Another was started by Commission auditors into the capital in-

vestment status of some 50 beer wholesalers. Under the new 1939 law, wholesalers must maintain a minimum \$7500 investment in the business.

"This does not mean that a dealer can show that much investment upon application for a license then transfer the investment later,"

Hugh A. Barnhart, Excise Administrator, warned. "Our auditors

will make periodic checks to see that the minimum is maintained." The Commission ruled that any dealer whose investment is found too low will face loss of his license.

Leaders of a temperance group in Muncie made the charge of an alleged alliance between the Commission agent and the beer business.

Beverage officials said they would investigate the charge thoroughly.

GAS AND OIL LEASE SALES SCRUTINIZED

An investigation into allegedly illegal sales of certificates for oil and gas leases in Indiana was started by the Indiana Securities Commission today.

Secretary of State James M. Tucker, under whose office the Commission operates, said "it is known that a number of agents and

dealers in these certificates are operating in Indiana and arrests are imminent."

He warned that all such securities must be duly registered with the Commission and that separate registration is required for agents or dealers handling them.
