

FOUR OFFICERS IN DOWNTOWN REGION ADDED

Assigned After Six Store
Doors Are Tampered With;
Loot Less Than \$20.

Chief Morrissey announced today he has assigned four additional officers to patrol the downtown area in attempt to halt attempts to burglarize store buildings.

Six doors were tampered with last night, but the loot was less than \$20.

Meanwhile, burglars entered garages of five homes in the 5300 block of Broadway and College Ave.

Enter Store on Circle

One of the stores entered was Lyman Bros. 31 Monument Circle. It had been entered before 11 o'clock last night, but nothing was taken.

About \$5 was stolen from the Harry Levinson Hat Store, 37 N. Pennsylvania St.

Harry Beynon, merchant police, found the door of the Merit Shoe Store, 332 W. Washington St., pried open about 9 o'clock last night. Nothing was missing.

The door of the Kistner Shoe Store, 33 S. Illinois St., was found broken open about the same time. Cash and desk drawers were ransacked, but nothing taken.

Burglars obtained \$15 in pennies at the Wiseman Clothing Co., 228 W. Washington St.

Attempt to 'Jimmy' Lock

Unsuccessful attempts were made to "pimmy" the lock at the Sally Frock Store at 34 W. Washington St. It was reported.

The North Side garage burglaries were at 5334 College Ave., flashlight taken; 5350 College Ave., camera equipment valued at \$25; 5345 Broadway, red-view mirror valued at \$2, and at 5341 and 5317 Broadway, nothing taken.

Officers said they found a raincoat in the vicinity that they believe belonged to one of the robbers. Fingerprints also were obtained from the looted automobiles.

Roines Founder Given Tribute at Banquet

CLUB AT MANUAL PAYS HONOR TO MISS ARDA KNOX

Members Representing 25
Years of Graduates
In Attendance.

Manual Training High School classes representing a quarter of a century joined last night at the Second Evangelical Reformed Church to pay honor to Miss Arda Knox, founder of the Roines.

Miss Knox, Manual faculty member, who organized the club 25 years ago, sat proudly at the head of the annual banquet while the class of 1914 to the class of 1938 rose in turn to pay tribute to Manual and to the Roines.

Honor members of the club who attended were E. H. K. McComb, Manual principal, J. H. Moore, Fred Schortemeyer, R. B. Morrison, K. V. Ammerman, C. B. Dyer, and Sheriff Fenney. Charles Stuart of the class of 1904 was made an honorary member of the Roines.

Miss Knox Speaks

A. R. Madison, '16, in introducing Mr. Stuart, quoted the new member as saying, "I was always sorry that there was no Roines club when I was in school."

Silver-haired Miss Knox, as honorary guest, was the featured speaker on the program. She recalled many of the hurdles the Roines Club had to cross before becoming firmly established at Manual.

"I think that the Roines was formed by the boys of '14 so that athletics could be resented at the school," she said. "She told of the field between Shortridge High School and Manual that existed the year before the Roines was formed. "As I recall it," she said, "there was a football game between the two schools and after the game was over several of the Shortridge students were seen wading out of White River. It has always remained a mystery how they got there, but there was a bridge to cross leaving the field and both teams crossed at the same time."

Competition Halted

This incident brought down the wrath of the school commissioners, according to Miss Knox, and there was no more competitive athletics between the two schools until after the formation of the Roines.

Cecil Byrne, local businessman and Manual graduate, performed feats of magic and demonstrated the art of juggling. He insisted he had learned his accomplishments while attending the classes of Miss Knox.

Other entertainment was provided by William Knipfach, Harold Light and Allan Smith, all members of the '38 club, who in trio, gave their version of "My Bonnie Lies Over the Ocean," the version resembling remarkably the 1938 swing trend, and "The Three Little Fishes," which was greeted with glee by the class of '14 as well as the recently graduated class of '39.

LOCAL MAN IS GIVEN YEAR IN LIQUOR CASE

LOGANSPORT, Ind., June 22 (U. P.)—William Mock, 34, of Indianapolis, today was under a one-year prison sentence on his plea of guilty to a charge of transporting liquor.

Mock was arrested more than two months ago when he broke through a blockade set up for a bandit.


