

## INDUSTRIAL GAS SALE INCREASES OVER '38 MARK

Gain in Number of Meters  
Also Is Reported by  
Citizens Utility.

An upturn in industrial operations here last month was indicated in figures made public today by the Citizens Gas & Coke Utility showing a substantial gain in industrial gas consumption.

Gains in the number of meters in operation and in commercial and house heating consumption, and a loss in domestic gas consumption also were reported.

The number of meters in use was reported as 87,315, an all-time record. The number in use in June, 1938, was 84,147, and for last May, 87,113.

Industrial gas consumption last month was 74,400,000 cubic feet, compared to 58,800,000 for June a year ago.

Commercial consumption increased from 25,400,000 a year ago to 27,400,000 last month, and house heating consumption from 2,500,000 a year ago to 4,100,000 cubic feet last month. Domestic consumption, 207,700,000 cubic feet, was 3,300,000 cubic feet less than in June, 1938.

The total consumption, 313,700,000 cubic feet, was a gain of 16 million cubic feet.

## FIGHTS OFF RESCUER, KILLED UNDER TRAIN

FRANKTON, Ind., July 7 (U. P.)—Mrs. Amanda E. Hays, 85, of Frankton, was fatally injured yesterday when she pulled out of the grasp of a rescuer and stepped in front of a Pennsylvania passenger train. Her death occurred only two blocks from a crossing where her husband was killed several years ago.



## But Don't Be Alarmed; They're Really Harmless

Nearly every day, some Indianapolis boy with an excited look in his eye walks into the State Library Building gripping a covered glass jar in both hands and looking as if he could use a police escort. He asks for the State Entomologist and presents him with the glass jar and prisoner, which invariably turns out to be an insect planned along the general lines of a nightmare.

"What," the boy asks in a sort of fascinated awe, "is that?"

Frank Wallace, the entomologist, is a man of few words, having short life history of the flies and their habits for publication.

They are also known as crawlers, amly, compulsion bugs, clippers, water grampuses, goggle goys, bo-garts, crocks, hell devils, flip-flaps, alligators, Ho Jacks, snake-doctors, dragons, and hell-divers.

They spend two years and 11 months of their lives under water, feeding on aquatic life and blustering around against heavy odds trying to fit themselves for adulthood.

Then, when they become adults, they crawl out of the water, which they have become used to, into the air, which they know nothing about, and promptly perish, as they should have known they would.

**New Bunch Coming Up**

Before they die, however, they see to it that thousands of more eggs are laid on foliage over water, which start a whole new generation.

They emerge from the water and crawl only at night, which shows the elements of good sense, but they eat nothing at all after they are in the air, which is considerably at variance with what is now known about sustaining life.

They are, in fact, one of the most spectacular failures known to insect life, and no matter how fierce they look, they are unlikely to make any sinister mark on society.

They are apt to scare you out of a good night's sleep, though.
