## Report Hot Weather Boon to T. B. Patients

The Indianapolis Flower Mission, agreeing with Dr. Herman G. Morgan, secretary of the City Board of Health, that summer is the most favorable health season, reported at a meeting yesterday that tuberculosis patients under their supervision felt better when thermometers passed 80.

In a survey of 30 chronic tuberculosis patients conducted by the women's organization, it was found that all were in better condition during hot weather. Mrs. David Ross, president of the group, pointed out that dangers from infection are at a minimum when doors and windows are open.

It was decided to continue special diets of oranges, butter and eggs. Mrs. Fred Noer, visitor, reported that patients received 1084 quarts of milk in June and that 111 mothers and children attended the annual picnic in Garfield Park last month. Surplus food was distributed among persons who were too ill to attend.

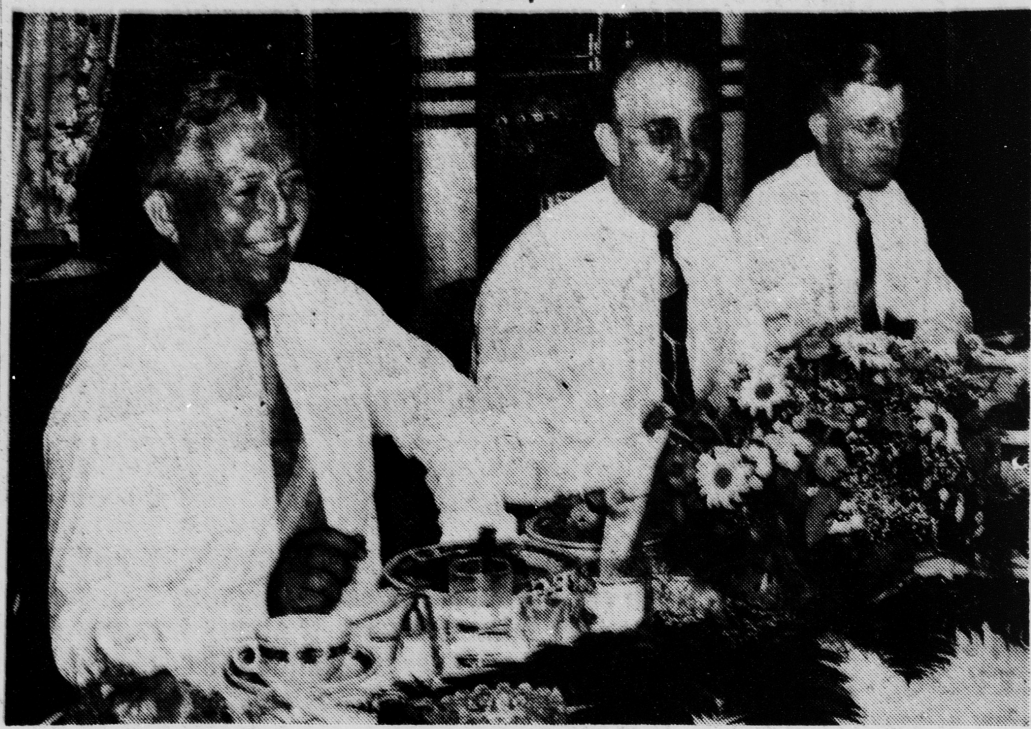
