

Cops Patrol Grandstand, Pop Bottles Are Barred; It's Dodgers vs. Giants

Four-Game Series Expected to Attract 100,000 Fans; Brooklyn Takes Over Third Place as Reds Knock Off St. Louis, 7 to 4.

NEW YORK, July 7 (U. P.).—The bitterest cut-throat baseball series in years was anticipated in the Giant-Dodgers set-to of four games in three days opening in Brooklyn today.

As an outgrowth of the Zeke Bonura-Leo Durocher brawl last week and Larry MacPhail's accusing Bill Terry of "intimidating umpires and trying to run the National League," the riot squad of the police department will be on hand and plainclothesmen will be distributed through the stands. All bottled drinks will be served in paper cups. The Brooklyn club has posted signs around the stands calling for fair play and threatening prosecution for ungentlemanly acts.

"Any one spotted hurling fire-crackers or a bottle on the field will be promptly arrested," it announced.

There's more bitterness in the feud than any attempt to drum up business. Bonura has said that two regular infielders and one regular outfielder on the Brooklyn club told him he should have given Manager Durocher a lacing for stepping on his foot in their imbroglio at the Polo Grounds. Durocher rested himself especially for the Giant series, and he isn't one to drop any argument.

More Fuel on Fire

More fuel was poured on the fire last night when Cincinnati knocked off the Cardinals, 7-4, and enabled the Dodgers to climb into third place above St. Louis. The Dodgers now trail the second-place Giants by only 2½ games and can take over the runnerup spot by winning four straight. The series was expected to draw 100,000.

Paul Derringer, extending his "control pitching" to 43-2-3 in consecutive innings without walking a man, led the Reds to triumph, increasing their lead to 5½ games. Although rapped for 14 hits, Derringer was great in the pinches, winning No. 11. A crowd of 28,000 attended the game at Cincinnati.

105 attended the game at Cincinnati. Pittsburgh took over fifth place by beating the Cubs, 7-2. Dizzy Dean was knocked out of the box in the fourth and charged with his first defeat. Fern Bell's triple with the bases packed in the eighth clinched the game.

White Sox Move Ahead

The White Sox moved into the first division of the American League by winning their fifth straight—an 8-1 triumph over Cleveland, which dropped the Indians into fifth place. Jack Knott held the Tribe to five hits while the White Sox knocked Johnny Allen out of the box in the second inning and collected 12 hits off four Cleveland Mounties. Gerald Walker hit a triple and homer.

A four-run rally in the eighth, started by Roy Cullenbine, enabled Detroit to trim the Browns, 9-5. Cullenbine, York and Greenberg made three hits each in the Tigers' 15-hit attack on four Brown hurlers. George Gaster snapped the Athletics' five-game losing streak last night in Philadelphia when he beat the Senators, 9-3, before 8732. Gaster gave up eight hits and held the Senators at bay except in the second, when they made all their runs.

ters under the terrific pressure. He was two under four passing the 15th and could afford even to waste a few strokes on the last three holes and still win. He finished up with a 36, one under par, for a 71 and the title which Reginald Whitcombe of England won last year.

Bulla had trouble with his putts again today and was using another new putter—his fourth since the Royal Ancient Club ruled before the tournament started that Johnny's regular putter was illegal. All through the round he alternately kissed the club when he holed out the long ones and threw it off the green in disgust when he missed the short ones, including a four-inch job on the morning round.

The favorites all finished far back in the pack. Henry Cotton of England, winner in 1934 and 1937 and 5-1 in the pretournament betting, ended up with a 298. Bobby Locke of South Africa, second favorite in the odds lists, and James Brien of Ireland, the medalist, were well out of it.
