

## TRAFFIC CLAIMS ANOTHER VICTIM

Man, Struck by Ambulance,  
Dies; Five Hurt in  
Accidents.

William R. Moore, who was struck by a City Hospital ambulance Tuesday, died last night at Methodist Hospital. He was 63.

Meanwhile, five persons were injured in 10 traffic accidents overnight.

Mr. Moore, who was the City's 58th traffic victim this year, was struck by the ambulance at Ohio and Meridian sts. At first, it was thought his injuries were of a minor nature, but later examination revealed internal injuries and several broken bones.

He had been employed by various clothing firms in Indianapolis since 1920 when he came here from New Bethel, Ind.

Mr. Moore, who was active in Masonic activities, is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mary Moore, and a sister, Mrs. Willis K. Miller. He lived in the Spink-Army Hotel. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

Eugene Balcon, 18, and John Balcon, 49, E. R. 9, Box 298, were injured when their motorcycle and a car collided at Southeastern Ave. and Pleasant Run Blvd. Both were taken to Methodist Hospital.

## PLEADS GUILTY TO 'EVIL EYE' KILLING

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 7 (U. P.).—Dominick Cassetti, 50, who contended that he was threatened with the "evil eye" if he failed to sprinkle his wife's spaghetti with "witch's powder," today pleaded guilty before a three-judge court to her poisoning last summer.

The diminutive Cassetti, who testified through an interpreter, was the second defendant in two days to plead guilty in Philadelphia's monstrous murder syndicate conspiracy. Cassetti maintained he was victimized and placed under a "spell" by Mrs. Providenza Micicich, 51, a fortune teller.

## SHRIVER TAKES POST AT PARK

Liberty Man Long Associ-  
ated With Private Schools  
And Boys' Work.

Officials of the Park School Foundation today announced the appointment of Henry B. Shriver, Liberty, Ind., as the third new master for the 1939-40 school term.

Mr. Shriver was added to the faculty, school officials said, because of an increase in enrollment.

He is a graduate of Mechanicsburg High School, Mechanicsburg, Pa., and of Franklin and Marshall College, Lancaster, Pa. He did graduate work at Yale University.

Mr. Shriver's experience in private school work has been varied, school officials said. He first taught at the old Brooks School in Indianapolis, the forerunner of the Park School. He then taught for five years each at the Choate School in Wallingford, Conn.; the Pebble Hill School in Syracuse, N. Y.; and the Allendale School in Rochester, N. Y. He teaches history and mathematics and has had experience as a football, baseball and basketball coach.

In summer months of the past 10 years he was a master at Camp Marienfeld in Chesham, N. H., and for three years he conducted a summer school at Syracuse, N. Y. During six other summers he traveled with groups of boys to the West Indies, South America and Alaska.

Mr. and Mrs. Shriver have two children, Suzanne, 13, and Billy, 11.

## SPY ORDER ADDS TO WORK OF FBI HERE

Concentration of all spy and espionage activity in the Federal Bureau of Investigation by President Roosevelt will increase the work of the local FBI staff, Harold Reincke, agent in charge, said today.

He explained that many of the cases which heretofore had not been within the direct scope of his department would now come under its jurisdiction. He added that the President's order evidently was issued to prevent any confusion in espionage cases, and offset any doubt as to what law enforcement agency should be consulted by police and other groups.

Mr. Reincke declined to reveal whether the local office had received any information of agents of foreign countries working in the vicinity of Indianapolis. He also declined to comment on whether the Indianapolis field office staff would be increased.

He said he had not received any instructions regarding organizing Indiana enforcement agencies into a spy and espionage campaign.

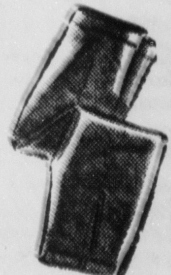

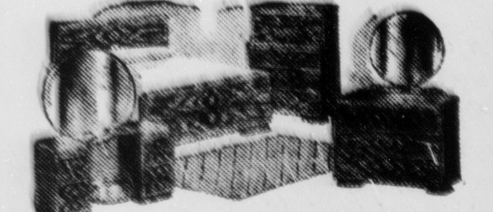

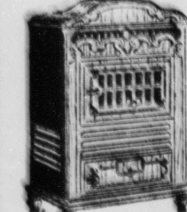
