

## C. I. O. EXPECTED TO GIVE BACKING TO NEUTRALITY

Murray Here for Rally: Silent on McNutt; Hits Profiteering.

American neutrality probably will be urged by the C. I. O. at its international convention at San Francisco next month, Philip Murray, C. I. O. executive vice president, said here today.

The Steel Workers Organizing Committee chairman is here to address a C. I. O. district rally at Tomlinson Hall at 8 p. m. today.

### Food Prices May Be Issue

Mr. Murray, who said neutrality and the 1940 national election probably would be major issues before the C. I. O. convention, indicated that a neutrality policy was favored in resolutions prepared by local unions.

The increase in some commodity prices also will bring convention action, he indicated.

"I rather feel from my own point of view," he said, "that we should oppose with vigor any attempt to war profiteering. I also feel that labor, and I'm speaking only for the C. I. O., will urge neutrality."

### Silent on McNutt

He declined comment on whether the C. I. O. would support the presidential candidacy of former Governor Paul V. McNutt.

"It is a little too premature to discuss candidates," Mr. Murray said. "There are a lot of lightning rods waving in the air, however, and we have a large number of candidates to consider."

## 4 GIVE TESTIMONY IN POLK MILK SUIT

Hearing on a petition of the Polk Sanitary Milk Co. for a temporary injunction against the Milk & Ice Cream Drivers Union, Local 744, was begun before Superior Court Judge Herbert M. Spencer today as the strike of some of the Polk drivers entered its sixth day.

An official of the milk company and three non-striking drivers testified during the morning session at alleged attacks on non-striking drivers last Saturday.

Testimony of union witnesses was to be heard this afternoon. A restraining order barring violence and interference with milk delivery, issued by Judge Spencer several days ago, expires at midnight tonight.

## ZONING AREA CHANGE URGED FOR DOUBLES

The Zoning Board today took under advisement a proposal to amend the zoning ordinance to raise the area requirements from 10,000 to 15,000 square feet for double houses on corner lots.

As drafted by the City Plan Commission, the proposal would eliminate the present 10,000-square-foot minimum which must be granted for double houses on appeal to the Board. This would give the Board power to reject any appeal to build a double on a corner lot less than 15,000 square feet, double the 7,500-square-foot minimum for single houses required in highly restricted districts.

Board members said at a special meeting yesterday that the removal of the 10,000-square-foot minimum in the law would enable them to discourage the building of double houses in exclusive residential sections.

Dr. Mary Angela Spink



Dr. Mary Angela Spink, president of the Fletcher Sanitarium here who died Sunday in Lisbon, N. H., was buried there Tuesday, according to word received here. "She was 75."

Dr. Spink, one of the first women graduates of the Indiana University School of Medicine, had been active in the direction of the Sanitarium until a year ago. She became ill several weeks ago at the home of her sister, Mrs. Raymond B. Stevens, at Lisbon.

Born in Washington, Ind., she attended the public schools and St. Simon's Academy at Washington. Before attending Indiana University, she attended a medical college in Cincinnati, then came to Indianapolis in 1884 as a special nurse at the Central State Hospital.

She assisted Dr. W. B. Fletcher in opening the Fletcher Sanitarium here in 1888, becoming president in 1907 following his death.

Dr. Spink was a member of the Board of State Charities 30 years. She was a member of the American County and State Medical Societies, of Nu-Sigma Phi medical fraternity, the Woodstock Club, Cosmopolitan Club and the John Heydon Art Institute.

She is survived by the sister in Lisbon; two other sisters, Dr. Ursula Spink, vice president and secretary of the sanitarium and Mrs. Bernard Cuniff, Washington, a niece, Miss Hilda Cuniff, Washington; a niece, Miss Hilda Cuniff, Washington; and two nephews, David Stevens, Harvard University, and Bernard Cuniff Jr., Indianapolis.

**SUBMIT ROAD BIDS UNDER ESTIMATES**  
Low bids for the paving of 34 miles of state highways totaled \$678,000 which was \$148,000 below the engineers' estimates, the State Highway Commission reported today.

The Commission also awarded contracts for paving 27 miles of roads on bids totaling \$152,000. The two largest projects included in the list of low bids received were for paving five miles on Road 35 in Martin County, on a bid of \$120,845 submitted by the Gast Construction Co. of Warsaw, Ind., and for paving of five miles on Road 1 in Allen County on a bid of \$189,901 submitted by The Moellering Construction Co., Ft. Wayne, Ind.

### Barbecued Hamburg Patties
