

5-YEAR TASK OF CHURCH MERGER TO BE FINISHED

Reformed Church to End Independent Existence At Conference Here.

Final details of the five-year-old merger of the Evangelical Synod of North America and the Reformed Church of the United States are to be perfected here in a three-day session of the Midwest Synod of the former Reformed Church starting tonight at 7:30 p. m.

The meeting is to be the 10th and last annual session of the Reformed Synod. It will be held in the Emmanuel Evangelical and Reformed Church.

Church officials explained that the merger was decided upon five years ago, with details separating the two churches to be worked out later. This meeting is to liquidate remaining business and accomplish final "ironing out."

175 to Attend

Approximately 175 delegates from the areas bounded on the west by Omaha, Neb., on the south by Nashville, Tenn., on the north by Waukegan, Ill., and on the east by Richmond, Ind., are scheduled to attend the meeting.

Religious services at tonight's meeting are to be led by the Rev. Matthew Worthman, Bluffton, Ind., vice president of the Synod. Synod President R. B. Meckstroth, Huntington, Ind., delivered a sermon on "Election of Every Nation."

Maynard R. Sullivan will greet the visiting delegates. Other welcome addresses were given by Elder Albert H. Giese of Emmanuel Church and by the Rev. Frank P. Puhman, Cumbeyland, Ind.

The Rev. Mr. Puhman is president of the united churches' South Indiana Synod, to which both Reformed and Evangelical churches of this area will henceforth belong.

Business Meetings Scheduled

Business meetings will intersperse the lectures and sermons during the entire session. John J. Haramy, professor at Indiana Central College, is scheduled to talk on "Unholy Things in the Holy Land" at 1:30 p. m. tomorrow, and the Rev. Louis W. Goebel, Chicago, president of the General Synod of the United Church, at 4:30 p. m. tomorrow.

Committee reports will be given Wednesday.

The Women's Missionary Society of the Midwest Synod is holding its annual meeting in conjunction with the meeting of ministers and elders. The women of the two former denominations are also to complete merger details at this meeting.

MOVES TO BLOCK PIPE LINE PROJECT

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—The Bluminous Coal Division of the Interior Department today asked the Federal Power Commission to intervene in an Indiana company's petition to build a gas pipe line from Kentucky to Indiana.

The General Pipe Line Corp., Indianapolis, asked the commission for a certificate of public convenience to construct a pipe line for gas from the Hart County, Kentucky, fields to Hamilton County, Indiana.

The Kentucky Gas Pipe Line Co. was allowed to intervene but railroads and individual coal companies were refused. The Interior Department requested to intervene in behalf of the coal industry.

It is seeking to show that such a pipe line as sought by the corporation would have deleterious effect upon both the coal and railroad businesses.

CALL WESTERN UNION WEST COAST STRIKE

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 11 (U. P.)—Mervyn Rathbone, international president of the American Communication Association, a Congress of Industrial Organization Union, said today that failure of the Western Union Telegraph Co. to engage in honest, collective bargaining might cause a nationwide strike of employees.

He came here to direct a strike of Western Union messengers, telegraph operators and accountants. He indicated that a deadline of Sept. 18 had been set for the company to meet the demands of the A. C. A.

M. T. Cook, general manager of Western Union here, said a full complement of workers reported for work yesterday in the operating and clerical departments. Strikers claimed that of an operating force of 300, only 58 passed picket lines.

INDIANA'S CWA RECORDS SAVED

WPA Will Film Documents And Movies Will Be Stored in Capital.

Years hence some historically-minded person may dig a 16-millimeter roll of film from a vault in a Washington office building and flash upon a screen documents of the Civil Works Administration in Indiana in 1933-34.

Work of saving the CWA documents will start soon under an \$18,781 WPA grant, according to Stanton T. Bryan, deputy state administrator.

All useless documents will be burned while those regarded as important will be "micro-filmed" on 16-millimeter rolls of film, he said.

This will be too small to read with the naked eye, but the documents when flashed upon the screen will be larger than normal size.

The tiny films will be sealed in cans and sent to Washington where they will be placed in fire-proof vaults.

Mr. Bryan estimated that the project for saving the CWA records would employ 25 persons here for 10 months. He said that all of them, including the photographers, would probably be taken from certified WPA rolls.

The project will empty several of the filing cabinets that now fill the basement of WPA headquarters at 1200 Kentucky Ave., and the district office at 22d and Yandies Sts.
