

AUTO INJURES PEDDLER, 52; DRIVER IS HELD

Two Others Hurt in Crashes
Overnight; Local
Woman Dies.

John Taylor, 52-year-old vegetable peddler, was in serious condition at City Hospital today as the result of injuries received late yesterday when he was struck by an automobile at Virginia Ave. and South St.

Two other persons were injured less seriously in seven overnight accidents, and 60 motorists were arrested by police.

Meanwhile, funeral services were being arranged for Mrs. Jane Wright, 642 Division St., who died yesterday of injuries received in an auto accident a few hours earlier on U. S. 40, seven miles east of Greenfield, in Hancock County. She was 64.

Police Arrest Driver
Mr. Taylor, according to police reports, was struck by an automobile driven by Karl G. Wagner, 30, of 1141 S. Keystone Ave., as he crossed the street. Police arrested Mr. Wagner on a reckless driving charge, releasing him on his own recognizance.

Mrs. Etta Taylor, 52, of 481 S. Pine St., and George Hattner, 55, Lebanon, Ind., were bruised in a three-car collision last night in the 4300 block of Madison Ave. Police said a truck driven by Mr. Hattner struck the car in which Mrs. Taylor was riding, forcing it against another car. No arrests were made.

Mrs. Wright was reported to have been en route to her summer cottage near Knightstown when her car collided with an oil truck driven by Carl Wilson, Dunreith.

Lived Here 26 Years
A resident of Indianapolis 30 years, she was a member of Trinity M. E. Church.

Services have been delayed until police are able to locate a son, Thomas B. Wright Jr., 24, with whom she lived, and who left Sunday for the New York World's Fair. Mrs. Wright also is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Carl V. Howe, Mrs. Raymond P. Baker and Mrs. Charles Davis, Indianapolis; a brother, Bert Miller, Terre Haute; three sisters, Mrs. Alice Wagner, Terre Haute; Mrs. Della Scott, Gary; and Mrs. Ellen Guilman, Miles City, Mont.

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2 EVENTS PUSH SLUM CAMPAIGN

Citizens Group, Housing
Authorities to Meet
This Month.

The Citizens' Housing Committee's drive for slum clearance here was pushed today as plans for a general committee meeting Sept. 20 and a State-wide conference of housing authorities here Sept. 26 were completed.

Carl Monsees, Chicago, field service division chief of the National Association of Housing Officials, will address the committee meeting on the work of the Federal slum clearance program in Indiana at 6 p. m. at the Central Y. W. C. A.

The principal speaker at the first annual conference of the Indiana Council of Housing Authorities at the Hotel Antlers six days later will be Jacob Crane, United States Housing Authority assistant director. The conference is being sponsored by the State Housing Board with the Citizens' Housing Committee serving as hosts.

The conference will feature five forum discussions which will be open to the public. Discussion topics include the theory of slum clearance, legal aspects of low-cost housing, community planning, the organization of local housing authorities and rural housing needs.

Kenneth Parmelee, Gary Housing Authority executive director, will be general chairman of the conference and Mr. Monsees will co-ordinate forum discussions.

BELT CAR LOADINGS GAIN 15 PER CENT

Belt Railroad freight car loadings from Indianapolis industries have shown a 15 per cent gain in the last three months, the first such gain recorded in "several years."

This was announced today by J. J. Liddy, superintendent, who said that during that period Indianapolis industries have more than kept pace with the road's business in general. General business of the road, which includes every car hauled by the Belt's engines, has been up every month this year as compared with last year, the road's records show.

BOXER FACES COURT IN MASS DEATH TRIAL

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 12 (U. P.)—The State began presentation of its case today against hulking Cesare Valenti, 55, mustached former blackhand and convict accused of being a "killer" for Philadelphia's "murder-for-insurance" syndicate.

The 250-pound boxer was charged specifically with complicity in the poison death of Charles Ingrao.

Meantime, the murder trial of Paul Petrillo, placid-faced, South Philadelphia "switch doctor" and alleged director of a syndicate branch, was in recess to enable the jurors to vote in today's primary elections. Charged with six murders, Petrillo is on trial in the poison death of Luigi La Vecchio.

BUTLER U. EVENING SCHOOL EXPANDED

The Butler University evening division curriculum has been expanded by nine courses for the coming year, according to Prof. George F. Leonard, director.

Five courses have been added to the College of Education courses, three to the Liberal Arts and Sciences Division, and one to the Business Administration course.
