

G. O. P. TO HEAR FRANK GANNETT AT RALLY HERE

Publisher Substitutes for Rep. Ditter; 20,000 May Attend Barbecue.

Substitution of Frank E. Gannett, Rochester, N. Y., publisher, for Rep. J. William Ditter (R. Pa.) as the principal speaker at the State G. O. P. 14-40 Roundup Saturday at the State Fair Grounds was announced today.

Mr. Gannett, publisher of 19 newspapers and a leader in the fight against the President's Supreme Court reorganization plan, was invited by party officials after Rep. Ditter, chairman of the Republican national congressional committee, sent word he would be unable to come here because of the special session of Congress.

Publicity Director Cancels Talk
Franklyn Waltman, national G. O. P. publicity director, also has canceled a speech scheduled for a luncheon Friday. Arch N. Bobbitt, state chairman, said another speaker is being sought for this meeting.

Other speakers at the Saturday mass meeting at the Fair Grounds grand stand will be Dr. Glenn Frank, Chicago, G. O. P. national program committee chairman; Homer E. Capehart, Washington, Ind.; Mrs. Bertha D. Bauer, Chicago, Republican national committeewoman, and former Senators James E. Watson and Arthur R. Robinson.

The rally is being sponsored by the Indiana Republican Editorial Association and the State G. O. P. Central Committee.

Editors to Meet Friday

Arrangements have been made for a crowd of more than 20,000 at the Fair Grounds barbecue meeting Saturday noon. The editors will hold their business sessions at the Claypool Hotel Friday at a luncheon and banquet at night.

The principal speaker at the Friday night banquet will be James J. Wadsworth, one of the younger members of the New York State Legislature. He is the son of Rep. James W. Wadsworth (R. N. Y.).

A parade comprised of 1200 banner-covered cars, 64 floats and 17 bands will proceed through the downtown streets at 10 a. m. Saturday and go to the Fair Grounds in time for the barbecue.

PEACE REMOTE IN NORTH SIDE TRUCK DISPUTE

Council Delays Action After Proposal on Deliveries Draws Protests.

City Council has abandoned hope of reaching an early settlement of Indianapolis' perennial truck traffic problem.

Action on an amendment to the present truck ordinance which would enable local trucks to use all North Side streets for deliveries was postponed after a public hearing last night at which North Side residents vigorously protested the proposal.

At the same session, Council passed an ordinance appropriating \$2500 as the City's share in the campaign of Frank Wallace, State entomologist, to rid several areas of Japanese beetles.

Extends Parking Ban

The Council also appropriated \$7000 from the 1938 anticipated Park Department balance to meet current expenses, approved the Park Department's request to sell unused park land along Fall Creek, and banned parking on E. St. Clair St. from Highland Ave. to Oriental St.

In protesting the proposed truck ban amendment, members of the North Side delegation charged the amendment would revive the situation the Council sought to solve last spring when it passed the present ordinance banning trucks on 11 principal North Side streets.

The proposed amendment was sought by local business firms which said they were handicapped in making deliveries.

Council President Joseph G. Wood said he did not see how the truck problem could be solved to the satisfaction of both truckers and residents for many years.

Represents Delegation

John McShane, attorney, representing some of the delegation members, said such streets as College Ave. cannot withstand the "pounding of heavy trucks."

Councilman Albert O. Deluse said Council has been considering the feasibility of using the abandoned Indiana Railroad tracks, skirting the North Side, as a belt highway for overland trucks.

Mrs. Minnie Phares, 4728 College Ave. told Council that trucks rumbled on College Ave. from midnight to 6 a. m. in violation of the present ordinance.
