Saddle Horse Roundup Expected To Draw 25,000 to Gregg Farms

About 25,000 horse owners and spectators will gather from all over the state tomorrow at the seventh annual Saddle Horse Association Roundup at Gregg Farms. The Indianapolis Girl Scouts are co-sponsors of the event. Preceding the show ring events, a "Church of the Woods" service will begin at 8:30 a. m. The opening ceremony, with a flag raising by the Girl Scouts of Marion County, will be held at 10:30 a. m. The arena program will run until dusk with a noon intermission for basket luncheons and picnics.

The history of saddle horses and horse-drawn vehicles will be depicted in the ceremonial pageant parade which begins the afternoon events at 1:30 p. m. Included in ring events are games and contests for riders, gaited classes for novices and amateurs, a pony express race, and an exhibition by the Traders Point Hunt. Parking space will be provided inside the grounds and Roundup buses will leave the Circle every 40 minutes from 8 a. m. to 1 p. m. and will be at the gate after the roundup for the return trip.

The annual "horse picnic," originated by Charles Gregg, Wallace O. Lee and Maurice Mendenhall, has been carried on by the Saddle Horse Association for the furtherance of interest in the saddle horse sport. Financial profits are turned over to charitable organizations. This year's co-sponsors, the Scouts, will use their share toward building an outdoor stadium at Camp Dellwood.

The Girl Scout Council is offering for the first time this year a trophy for a local Scout who is the best example of the ideal Girl Scout in her conduct and activities at the roundup. A large silver bowl will be presented to the winner at the close of the day's events.
