

SEEK TO ALTER G. O. P.'S ORDER OF NOMINATION

Harness' Friends Discuss
Plan to Give Him Advan-
tage in Senate Race.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Friends of Rep. Forest A. Harness, both here and in Indiana, are discussing a plan to reverse the order of nominations in the Republican state convention and thus give the Kokomo Congressman a better chance to compete for the United States senatorship, it was learned today.

Their theory is that should Glen Hillis, the Kokomo candidate for governor, fail to make the grade, Rep. Harness well might compete against Raymond E. Willis, the only announced candidate for the senatorship.

It has been customary to nominate the Senator first and then the Governor, but under this scheme the Governor would be chosen first and the Senator last.

Tucker May Enter Race

If a re-nominated Congressman enters the field, however, it is considered quite likely that the dean of the delegation, Rep. Charles A. Halleck, may have first call.

But both Reps. Harness and Halleck might meet with opposition from another quarter than that of former Candidate Willis, however, if the batting order is reversed.

For in the event that Judge James A. Emmert would beat both Mr. Hillis and State Senator William E. Jenner for the gubernatorial nomination, Secretary of State James M. Tucker might not seek re-nomination but try for the United States Senatorship, it has been pointed out.

He is more or less effectively barred from doing so now since Senator Jenner comes from the same southern part of the State.

Martin Gives Report

One factor that may cause the G. O. P. to select the best possible candidate this year is the report brought back here by Rep. Joseph W. Martin Jr. (R. Mass.), who was the Beefsteak dinner speaker at the Columbia Club in Indianapolis.

The Republican Floor Leader predicted upon his return that Pennsylvania, Ohio, Illinois and Indiana will go Republican this year, but he added that of these four states the toughest fight will be in Indiana.

"I think we can win out in Indiana," Rep. Martin said. "But it will take organization, hard work and a first class candidate to do so."

He declined to say which he would take if the choice rested between his two colleagues—Reps. Harness and Halleck.

Credit Is Good

10-Year-Old Boy Is First to Get Music Turn-Table 'On Time.'

Because of his interest in music and his enterprise and integrity, Irving Prince, 10-year-old pupil at School 81, today became the only person in Indiana to be extended credit in the music appreciation campaign.

Irving was one of 4500 school children who heard a recorded symphony program at Tech High School. He also heard talks by Edward T. Ingle, director of the National Committee for Music Appreciation, and Dr. Peter W. Dykema, Columbia University music educator.

After the concert, the boy requested Mrs. Elizabeth Kalte Cochran, head of the Tech music department to introduce him to Dr. Ingle—he had something personal to talk to him about.

Irving wanted one of those electric turn-tables which are being distributed to play the recordings through a radio. He wanted it right now and from his earnings he had saved only \$3.50, short of the price of the turn-tables.

It hasn't been policy to extend credit to purchasers of either recordings or the playing devices at distribution headquarters, 245 N. Pennsylvania St. But Mr. Ingle was impressed by the boy's enthusiasm and love of music.

So the arrangements were made. Irving paid his \$3.50 and took one of the turn-tables to his home, 2445 Coyner Ave. He'll pay the balance as he earns it and eventually will be given a "paid in full" receipt.

Two of the series of 10 symphonies are now available. They are Schubert's Unfinished Symphony and Beethoven's Symphony No. 5 in C Minor.
