

# HOGS ADVANCE 5 CENTS HERE CATTLE STEADY

Top Boosted to \$6.15 at  
Stockyards as 1700  
Porkers Arrive.

Hog values at Indianapolis regained the early and mid-week slump when 15 cents was added to the price list today, the Agricultural Marketing Service reported.

Falling dressed pork trade carried live prices downward until Wednesday when prices here were checked temporarily. Thursday's trade slid again but the strong to higher comeback yesterday and today made up the difference on weights from 160 pounds upward. Lighter averages are still 10 cents short of last week's closing prices.

Today's schedule originated on holiday account but other interests quickly followed. While the top went to \$6.15, still allowed for 220 to 240-pound averages, occasionally premium sales for choice, uniform hogs saw some pens move at mostly 5 cents above the list prices. Packing shows shared 10 to 15 cents of the higher money.

Cattle prices were steady. Tries for a definitely lower market early this week were only partially successful and early losses were regained later with about 25 cents added in the steer division. Most of the fat cows and heifers shared the 15 to 25-cent rise from last Friday but sausage bulls closed dull and most of a quarter lower. Vealers pulled out under early \$1 losses, the closing peak showing at \$1.10.

Very short numbers of sheep and lambs furnished little testing material and no price changes appeared.

# WHEAT STEADY AT CLOSE OF TRADING

CHICAGO, May 11 (U. P.).—Wheat futures on the Chicago Board of Trade were weak today under continued liquidation pressure but trade dwindled to light proportions after recent war action.

An extension of mid-season strength brought wheat prices back to near yesterday's levels to close off 1/4 to 1/2 cent. May closed at \$1.08 1/2. Corn was unchanged to off 1/4 cent. May, 68¢ 1/2; oats off 1/4 cent. May, 41¢, and rye to 1/4 cent. lower, May, 68¢ 1/2. Soybeans were irregular, off 1/4 to 1/2 cent. May, \$1.07.

The Government winter wheat estimate released after the close yesterday and indicating a considerably improved outlook exerted some pressure. Belief that little export business can be expected to develop from the new war activity until the status of the Low Countries is settled also tended to dampen bullish enthusiasm.

Reports that black stem rust had been discovered on Texas wheat brought a quick bullish movement about mid-session but the buying was not sufficient to recover earlier losses. The crop observer who discovered the virulent rust expressed belief that late season wheat would be exceptionally vulnerable. Mill demand was strong late in the session.
