



JOB OUTLOOK
HELD BETTER

Less Stigma Now on Older
Workers, Forty Plus
Club Is Told.

The older worker has a better chance of finding a job now than he has had for many years, George J. Smith told the Forty Plus Club last night.

Mr. Smith, manager of the Indianapolis field office of the State Employment Service, spoke at a club meeting in the Chamber of Commerce offices.

"Now is the time for older workers to evaluate their abilities and concentrate upon a definite job-hunting campaign," he said, declaring that "every survey" in recent years has shown less discrimination against older workers.

He said that the Employment Service has fewer work applications from workers between 40 and 60 than between 20 and 40, and he called attention to a survey made this year by the National Association of Manufacturers which showed that workers over 40 were the "best employees."

The N. A. M. survey revealed that older workers were less subject to severe accidents because they were more careful about moving machinery and that they were therefore, less employment risks. He said the survey also showed that older workers were more reliable and more stable.

"Employers should be informed concerning these facts about the older worker," Mr. Smith said.

5 IOWANS KILLED AS
AIRPLANE CRASHES

AREDALE, Iowa, June 13 (U. P.)—Butler County authorities investigated today the tangled wreckage of an airplane in which five persons, three of them members of one family, rode to their deaths. The craft went into a tailspin 250 feet above the ground.

Clarence Barnett, whose wife and two sons were among those killed, was the only witness to the crash.

Mr. Barnett had planned to go aloft with his family, but instead gave his seat to Carl Pfaltzgraff, 25, Dumont, Iowa, automobile salesman. The others in the plane were Chester and Clark Bennett, their mother and Maybelle Vane, Dumont, an employee on the Barnett farm.

2 CITY YOUTHS PASS
FLYING CADET TESTS

Two Indianapolis youths have been selected for enlistment as flying cadets in the U. S. Army Air Corps.

They are Robert D. Fattig, 117 N. Drexel Ave. and George K. Williams, 317 E. 47th St. Both will report to Ft. Harrison June 21 for enlistment and then go to the Chicago School of Aeronautics for a three-months primary flight and ground school training course.

Upon successful completion of the primary course, the cadets will be sent to Randolph Field, Tex., "the West Point of the Air" and from there to Kelly Field, Tex. for advanced military flying.


