

TAMMANY HALL BACKS FLYNN AS NEW CHAIRMAN

Rallies to Successor of Farley Whom It Once Tried to Exile.

NEW YORK, Aug. 2 (U. P.).—Edward J. Flynn, 48, Irish Catholic, who rose from the ranks of a Bronx precinct worker to boss of the Democratic National Committee and director of President Roosevelt's third term campaign, won the support today of Tammany Hall, the once powerful machine which had tried to make him a political outcast.

On Aug. 17 Mr. Flynn steps into the driver's seat vacated by James A. Farley. Mr. Flynn and Mr. Farley had collaborated to bring about Mr. Roosevelt's first nomination in 1932. Mr. Farley actively opposed a third term but Mr. Flynn went along.

Back in the palmy days when Tammany was a political power, Mr. Flynn, Democratic boss of the Bronx, and its ally, threatened a rebellion when the Hall sought to renominate James J. Walker for Mayor after he had resigned under fire.

Tiger Bowled to Him
The Hall bowed to Mr. Flynn's wishes and nominated and elected John P. O'Brien. The following year Mr. Flynn supported Joseph V. McKee as Recovery Party nominee against Mr. O'Brien and the split resulted in the election of Mayor F. H. La Guardia.

The split widened when the Hall supported the nomination of Alfred E. Smith at the Chicago 1932 Democratic convention which nominated Mr. Roosevelt.

Mr. Flynn's selection surprised Tammany leaders, but they rallied to his support.

When he was Governor of New York, Mr. Roosevelt, appointed Mr. Flynn Secretary of State saying, "I have known Eddie Flynn for many years and I have the highest respect for him as a man and for his ability. I consider his acceptance of a place in my administration an honor."

Mr. Flynn remained Secretary of State under Mr. Roosevelt and Governor Herbert H. Lehman until Jan. 1, 1939, when he resigned because of poor health.

Given Fair Post
He then was appointed by Mr. Roosevelt United States Commissioner General to the New York World's Fair.

Mr. Flynn is regarded as one of Mr. Roosevelt's closest friends. He and Mrs. Flynn have been frequent guests at the Roosevelt home in Hyde Park, also in Washington and Warm Springs, Ga. He has been host several times to the Roosevelts at his summer home at Lake Mahopac.

HE'S STRANGER, WORD ON FLYNN

Hoosier Democrats in Washington Say They Don't Know Him.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—Hoosier Congressional Democrats today were unanimous in their not knowing the new Democratic National Chairman, Edward J. Flynn of New York.

Because President Roosevelt picked him, after two New York Republicans, Secretary of War Stimson and his assistant, Judge Robert Patterson, were so recently selected, one Indiana wag added the comment: "Any way I am glad to see that he selected a Democrat from New York."

"Never Heard of Him"
The constant appointment of New Yorkers by President Roosevelt long has been a sore point with the Democrats from the other 47 states. Senator Sherman Minton said that he did not care to comment on the Flynn appointment, as he was not familiar enough with the man or his record to have an opinion regarding either one.

This same lack of knowledge, outside of hearing the name, was shown by the Congressmen.

"Never heard of him," Rep. John W. Boehne Jr. said when asked about the new national chairman.

McNutt Vacationing
"I think I have met him," said Rep. Eugene B. Crowe, "but it would be wrong to say that I know him, because I am not even sure of that. It is a good thing to know that he is a Democrat."

Rep. Louis Ludlow declared that he doesn't know him either.

Federal Security Administrator Paul V. McNutt was among those being mentioned for the post. But when the meeting was held at the White House yesterday, where Mr. Flynn was selected, Mr. and Mrs. McNutt were on a vacation tour in the White Mountains.

WILLKIE PLACES HOPE IN VOTERS' INDEPENDENCE

Those Who 'Vacillate' Now Control Elections, Nominee Says.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 2 (U. P.).—Wendell L. Willkie bases his expectation of election to the presidency upon the power of the independent voter.

Party delineation upon the basis of "label alone" is decreasing every year, Mr. Willkie said, and the controlling election factor now is the independent voter who breaks from party lines according to the issue.

This year, the Republican presidential nominee said, one of the principal issues swaying vacillating voters is the Third Term question, on which he has received a cordial response from his own party and Democrats alike.

Talks to W. A. White
Mr. Willkie's remarks on independent voters were made yesterday during a joint interview between newspapermen here and the venerable William Allen White, Emporia, Kas., editor and political commentator.

The candidate remarked that today "fully half of the voters cross party lines early," adding that political pride is based upon a voter's independence, rather than upon the party loyalty of his ancestors of 25 years or more.

Confers With Martin Tonight
The trend toward Republicanism in Kansas this year is as obvious as the Democratic trend in 1936, Mr. White told Mr. Willkie.

The candidate said he proposes to make a campaign issue of the increase in population of Washington, which gained almost 230,000 persons in the last decade, while other metropolitan centers either stood still, lost or made slight gains. He indicated that he intends to blame this rise on the "bureaucracy of the New Deal."

Tonight he dines with Joseph Martin, G. O. P. National Chairman and minority leader of the House, as a prelude to a general campaign conference tomorrow with other party leaders.

This conference will include John Hamilton, former National Chairman and now Mr. Martin's executive assistant; Governor Harold Stassen of Minnesota, keynote at the Philadelphia convention; Willkie's floor manager, Sam Pryor, National Committeeman from Connecticut and probably several others.

M'KELLAR WINNER IN TENNESSEE VOTE

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 2 (U. P.).—State and national leaders in the Democratic Party of Tennessee were renominated in yesterday's primary, conclusive returns showed today.

The Democrats gave thumping renomination majorities to Senator Kenneth D. McKellar, a Senate veteran of 23 years; Governor Prentice Cooper, seeking a second term; and two of the three U. S. Representatives who faced opposition. The third, Rep. Joseph W. Byrns Jr., held a comfortable lead.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Aug. 2 (U. P.).—U. S. Senator A. B. (Happy) Chandler was heavily favored to win the Democratic nomination for the unexpired term of the late Senator M. M. Logan tomorrow in one of Kentucky's quietest primary elections.

Charles P. Farnsley, 33, of Louisville, chief opponent of Mr. Chandler, has urged immediate aid to Great Britain and has denounced Mr. Chandler as an isolationist.

SON'S PRANKS DELAY 'PUNCTUAL' MAYOR

BOSTON, Aug. 2 (U. P.).—Public officials and friends of Mayor Maurice J. Tobin were a bit puzzled when the usually punctual chief executive arrived late for many important engagements. Furthermore, when they telephoned him the line was always busy.

UNION, HARVESTER RENEW CONTRACT



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
