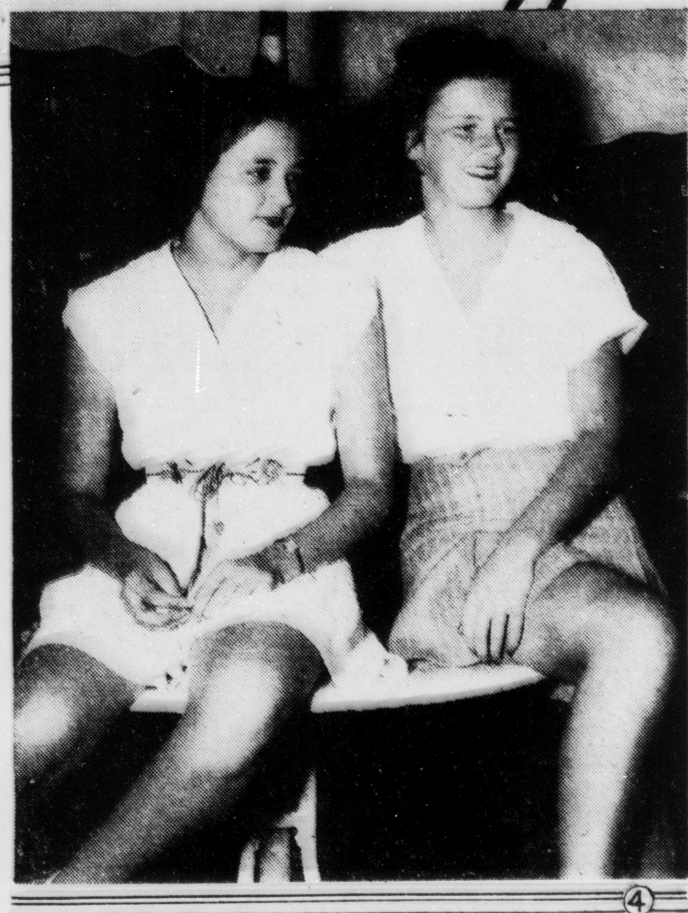

W. C. T. U. to Elect Officers Tuesday

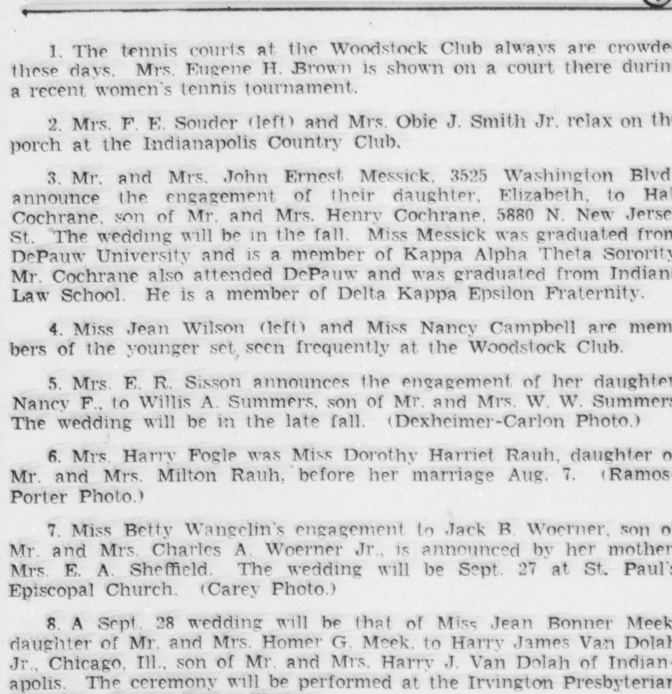
