Bing's New Picture Is Swell and So Was the Preview Party at Del Mar

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 26.—Bing Crosby had a winner on his race track at Del Mar the other night. It was a picture, not a horse. "Rhythm on the River" was previewed there for all members of the press and a few score notables who were willing to travel three-quarters of the way to San Diego.

There were several added attractions, and a special train from Los Angeles. First came luncheon in the patio of the elegant Turf Club, and then the afternoon's races. Next, cocktails and a broadcast, dinner, the picture, and highballs on the north-bound train.

Paramount and Mr. Crosby paid for everything except the participation tickets and my transportation. I went down, and back next day, in a little red plane jockeyed by Ed Churchill, the studio's flying publicist.

While actually in the air, we passed everything except Mary Martin, who was whisked down in one of Paul Mantz's charter-elopement ships. But with our safety dictated overnight stop, and having to hang the plane in San Diego, and pausing four hours on the way back to tinker with a temperamental oil radiator, we were 12 hours slower than the special train. However, the sea was blue and the sky puffed with snowy cumulus; resort towns were picture-postcard-bright in their carnival confetti; a nudist colony—

Glenn Fiermood, Indianapolis singing teacher, expects to be at work in his new studio at 1722 N. Delaware St. by the first of next week.

This is the studio formerly occupied by the late Fred Newell Morris, for many years a well-known voice teacher. Mr. and Mrs. Fiermood will live in the residence adjoining the studio.

Mr. Fiermood, former head of the Jordan Conservatory voice faculty, has maintained studios at 1800 N. Delaware St. for the last two years.

4000 ALIENS IN CITY TO SIGN UP UNDER NEW ACT

Each One Over 14 Must Register Before Dec. 26, Seidensticker Says.

Registration of Indianapolis' 4000 aliens will begin tomorrow at the Postoffice and continue to Dec. 26. An estimated 3,600,000 are expected to register in the U. S.

Ordered as a part of the national defense program, each alien over 14 must register in person at the Postoffice, and be fingerprinted. Children under 14 may be registered by their parents or guardians.

Refusal Carries Fine

While trouble in receiving registrations is not anticipated, Postmaster Adolf A. Seidensticker said that "refusal to register or failure to answer the questions truthfully carries a fine of \$1000 and a six-months' prison term."

Some of the questions the alien must answer are:

How long do you intend to stay? How did you get here?

What military training or service have you experienced and what organizations are you affiliated with?

The overwhelming majority of non-citizens in the United States are loyal to the spirit and traditions and laws of America," Mr. Seidensticker said, "but there is a small minority of disloyal aliens whose activities are dangerous to our ideals and way of life.

Nothing to Fear

"This dangerous element the United States intends to weed out. To do this, the Government must find out who and where they are. This is the purpose of the registration program."

Aliens have nothing to fear in the registration and all information collected will be filed at Washington and will be available only to the Government, the postmaster said.

Don't Crowd, Director Urges 3,600,000 Aliens

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (U. P.)—Earl G. Harrison, Director of Alien Registration, asked aliens today not to stampede Postoffice registration centers which will begin tomorrow to record their names and fingerprints.

He said that the registration of 3,600,000 aliens is a tremendous task and the time for preparation has not been sufficient to perfect the machinery in every village. The organization, however, he said, is completely ready in the larger cities.

He said that the actual registration would take approximately 30 minutes for each person.

Mr. Harrison said that any alien who will be leaving the country before Dec. 26 need not register. Any alien who arrives in this country after the beginning of registration tomorrow must register if he intends to stay in the United States more than 30 days.

He said that aliens holding first naturalization papers must register. When they become citizens their registration records will be placed in a "dead" file.

MADDEN'S TERM AS NLRB HEAD AT END

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (U. P.)—One of the most controversial issues of the New Deal administration of the Wagner Labor Relations Act—required an expression of future policy today by President Roosevelt.

The five-year term of the National Labor Relations Board Chairman J. Warren Madden, expires tomorrow. Failure to make an appointment will vacate the chairmanship and leave the Board without a deciding vote. The other two Board members do not agree on issues of administration and policy.

The White House has given no intimation what the decision will be. Some sources say Mr. Madden's reappointment is a certainty; others say that a new member will be appointed.

Principal opponent to reappointment of the present chairman in the ranks of labor is President William Green of the American Federation of Labor. Daniel J. Tobin, head of the powerful A. F. of L. Teamsters Union, is said to have approved the reappointment.

HOPE FOR ACTION ON PROFITS BILL

Measure Now Deadlocked Selects 1936 to 1939 as Normal Earning Base.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—The House Ways and Means Committee continues consideration of an excess profits tax-amortization bill today with its chairman "hopeful" that it will be ready for House action this week.

Chairman Robert L. Doughton's statement was made after President Roosevelt had demanded action. The committee has been deadlocked on the provisions of the bill which has been described as a vital need in speeding the rearmament program.

Rep. Doughton predicted yesterday—24 hours after he and Chairman Jere Cooper of the tax subcommittee had conferred with the President—that his committee would report a bill within a few days combining provisions for a graduated excess profits tax, for writing off over a five-year period the cost of defense plant expansion, and for

suspension of the Vinson-Trammell Profits Limitation Act.

As now drafted, the bill would select the years 1936 to 1939, inclusive, as the base period on which normal earnings would be established for purposes of computing excess profits for 1940 and later years.
