

## W. C. MARMON'S PRIVATE RITES SET TOMORROW

Manufacturer, Civic Leader  
Was 68; Helped Found  
Community Fund.

Private services will be held tomorrow for Walter C. Marmon, prominent manufacturer and civic leader, who died yesterday at his home in Brandon. Burial will be at Crown Hill.

Mr. Marmon was 68, was chairman of the board of the Marmon-Herrington Co. and has been president of its predecessor, the Marmon Motor Car Co. here.

Born in Richmond, he moved here four years later with his parents, Daniel W. and Elizabeth M. Marmon. After attending Earlham College and graduating from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Mr. Marmon went to work for the E. & H. Nordyke Co., a milling machinery firm in which his father had purchased an interest.

President in 1909

In 1897, he became secretary of the company, then known as the Nordyke & Marmon Co., and when his father died in 1909, became its president. He was named chairman of the board in 1924.

The firm built Hall-Scott and Liberty airplane motors for the Government during the World War.

Mr. Marmon was president of the Noblesville Milling Co. and former chairman of the board of the Indianapolis Power & Light Co. A former president of the Indianapolis and Central Indiana Boy Scout Council, he donated the swimming pool at the Scout Reservation in memory of his son, Franklin Hall Marmon, who died in 1924.

He also helped to found the Indianapolis Community Fund in 1920 and for three years served as its general chairman.

Belonged to Woodstock Club

Mr. Marmon was survived by his wife, the former Miss Annie Burroughs Hall; two daughters, Mrs. Frank Holz, Indianapolis, and Mrs. Philip L. Boyd, Palm Springs, Cal.; a sister, Mrs. J. W. Pester, Indianapolis; a brother, Howard C. Marmon, of North Carolina, and six grandchildren.

The family has asked friends to omit flowers.

Mr. Marmon was a member of the Woodstock Club, the Columbia Club, Indianapolis Chapter of the Citizens Historical Association, and the Second Presbyterian Church.

## DEMAND ON WPA PURSE GROWING

Entire Appropriation May  
Be Used by February,  
Spokesman Says.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (U.P.)—A Works Project Administration spokesman said today that the \$975,650,000 WPA appropriation for the 1940-41 fiscal year may be used up by February.

Although the WPA cannot forecast their rolls beyond October, it was said that winter relief needs, if they rise, would make it necessary for the WPA to spend its entire appropriation by February.

Congress passed the WPA appropriation with a proviso that it could be spent in eight months if conditions warranted, but urged Commissioner F. C. Harrington to make it last 12 months.

Despite rises in private employment, WPA rolls are not showing corresponding decreases, officials said. The WPA is operating on an eight-month basis with a summer quota of around 1,700,000 persons. The October authorization was fixed at 1,800,000.

With the expected winter increases, the WPA would have a monthly average of 1,962,500 clients for the year.



**ISOLATION OF U. S.  
DEFENDED BY NYE**

WINONA LAKE, Ind., Aug. 30 (U.P.)—Senator Gerald P. Nye (R. N. D.) last night defended United States' self-isolation from the European war in a three-sided debate with Clark Eichelberger and Dr. Kirby Page of La Habra, Cal., before the National Conference of Methodist Youth.

"I respect people who honestly acknowledge that steps short of war are really steps to war," Mr. Nye asserted. "I have voted against such steps and when the invitation to declare war comes I am going to vote against it, too. I am not going to destroy Hitlerism in ourselves. Through my heart goes out to Great Britain, I do not necessarily want to see her win the war. I would rather see the European conflict end in a stalemate."

Mr. Eichelberger favored defense of the United States by sending all aid possible short of troops to Britain.

He said the United States cannot expect to exist as an island of democracy in a sea of totalitarianism.

"Though I am opposed to the idea of the United States sending an expeditionary force to England, I continue to favor giving all aid short of war to Great Britain so that she may resist Hitler and become the aggressor in the spring. The success of Great Britain is the last chance of America avoiding war."
