Colonels Come to Town On Legion Night

The Indianapolis Indians come in off the road today after experiencing a record run of rainy weather in the North that washed eight of their games off the American Association schedule.

The opponent in the brief home stand will be the Louisville Colonels and the series will open under the lights at Perry Stadium tonight at 8:15.

A single tilt is scheduled tomorrow night and a double-header Sunday afternoon, after which the Redskins will hit the road for the last time, playing in Louisville, Columbus and Toledo. Then will come the season's curtain series at the Tribe park, against the Mud Hens and Red Birds.

It's Legion Night

American Legion Night is to be celebrated at the Stadium this evening and Johnny Vander Meer of big league double no-hit fame will make his farewell appearance on the Tribe mound against Bill Burwell's Colonels.

Vander Meer is to report back to the Cincinnati Reds tomorrow, at the request of Red Manager Bill McKechnie and on recommendation of Tribe Manager Jewel Ems.

By joining the Reds tomorrow, Vandy will be eligible for World Series competition in the event the Reds repeat as National League champs.

Vander Meer has won six games and lost three while down with the Indians recuperating from a spell of lost control.

So Long and Good Luck

Johnny has worked hard here and has hustled at all times. He has overcome much of the wild pitching that handicapped him early in the season while with the Reds.

Manager Ems puts it this way: "I think he will help the Reds, particularly against some of those teams loaded down with southpaw hitters."

The Indians regret to see their new pal depart, but they do not wish to stand in his path to World Series participation and a cut in the heavy financial melon.

Since the American Legion is celebrating its annual night here tonight, the game will not be free to women, although the attraction falls on a customary ladies' night. The season pass list also will be suspended tonight.

To make it up for the feminine customers, they will be given a ladies' night tomorrow.

In their final games on the last swing through the West, the Indians were knocked off in Minneapolis last night. The Millers charged from behind to win the first half of the scheduled double-header, a slugging bee, 14 to 10.

The contest was featured by home runs with the bases loaded by Allen Hunt of the Indians and Otto Denning of the Millers. A seven-run rally in the eighth put Minneapolis across.

The teams fought to a 2-to-2 five-inning tie in the second game. It was necessary for the Indians to get out of there and the umpires called off the action without a decision to allow them to catch a train.

Bob Logan and Don French worked on the Tribe mound in the opener and Red Barrett pitched the doubleheader contest. Minneapolis used Haefer, Tauscher, and Smythe in the first tilt and Hogsett in the second.

Logan falls in seventh. In the opener the Indians collected 14 blows to 15 for Minneapolis. The Tribe held a 7-to-1 lead early in the game but the Millers kept nudging along and finally batted Logan out of the box in the seventh.

However, as things turned out French was charged with the defeat. Milton Galatzer paced the Indians' attack with four hits.

On the road journey, the Indians won one game, lost four and tied one.

Perfection of Packer Passes Mystifies All-Stars, 45-28

Five Green Bay Touchdowns Come Through the Air—Kinnick, Schindler Shine

CHICAGO, Aug. 30.—Green Bay's mighty Packers, five times world professional football champions, still are sheer perfection in the art of forward passing—and let the National League be warned.

Before a record crowd of 84,567 at Soldier Field last night, the Packers overwhelmed a rough, well-drilled squad of collegiate All-Stars, 45 to 28, with the neatest assortment of aerial skullduggery at their command.

They were at a typical Green Bay best and the deft manner in which their passing mystified such capable backs as Nile Kinnick of Iowa, Banks MacFadden of Clemson, Kenny Washington of U. C. L. A., and Amby Schindler of Southern California, indicated the Packers are ready to defy the old All-Star jinx. No professional team has retained its championship since they began to play in Chicago's charity spectacle.

A Great Victory

It was a great victory for Green Bay. The Packers, over-confident and overweight, lost a 6-to-0 decision in 1937 and that defeat still ranked as they came out under the floodlights last night. Too, it gave the National League the lead in the series, three victories to two. Two have been tied.

Here's how effectively the Packers were passing:

1. Cecil Isbell to Don Hutson, 81-yard touchdown.
2. Isbell to Carl Mullenau, 29-yard touchdown.
3. Ernie Herber to Andy Uram, 40-yard touchdown.
4. Isbell to Hutson, 35-yard touchdown.
5. Herber to Hutson, 30 yards and a score.

Another long one, 25 yards from Isbell to Mullenau, set up their other score and Isbell promptly scampered four yards around his own right end for the touchdown.

Ernie Smith, who kicked four of Green Bay's extra points, completed the scoring with a 34-yard field goal in the fourth period.

Schindler Scores First

For the All-Stars, two boys who probably will not play professional ball, provided the spark that kept the collegians in the game. Schindler and Kinnick held the backfield together, ambling Amby with his powerful leg-drive and Kinnick with his great passing.

Schindler scored the first touchdown of the game, personally juggling the ball from the 13-yard line in three plays through Green Bay's massed defense. His interception of Isbell's first pass paid the way.

Kinnick's pass to Ken Kavanaugh, of Louisiana State, good for 24 yards, set up a one-yard touchdown plunge for Washington and Kinnick's 27-yard pass to MacFadden scored another. MacFadden caught the ball on the Green Bay 30 and scooted down the sidelines untouched.

Washington and Schindler combined on the All-Stars' fourth period touchdown which ended with the Trojan bowling over from the one-yard line.

Eddie Anderson of Iowa, elected head coach by more than 5,000,000 fans, used 37 of his squad of 68 collegians.

Not a one had an answer for Packer passes.
