## KEEP ON GIVING, F. D. R. URGES

**Pleads for Liberal Support To Local Community Chest Campaigns.**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (U.P.)—Local community chest campaigns for funds began today with an appeal by President Roosevelt for liberal contributions to maintain national morale "in a world poisoned by hatred and ravaged by war."

Mr. Roosevelt, inaugurating the 1940 mobilization for human needs in a radio address last night, said that citizens, in this critical moment of our history, must be increasingly conscious of the "community spirit" expressed by the annual mobilization drive.

"It is a spirit that comes from our community of interests, our democratic ideal, our community of devotion to God," he said.

## Ancient Injunction Cited

"... Events abroad have warned us not only of the need of planes and tanks, and ships and guns; they have also warned us of the need of grit and sacrifice of daring and devotion, and all of those intangible things which go to make up a nation's morale..."

Human kindness has never weakened the stamina or softened the fibre of a free people, a nation does not have to be cruel in order to be tough. The vigorous expression of our American community spirit is truly important.

"That ancient injunction to love thy neighbor as thyself is still the force that animates our faith—a faith that we are determined shall love and conquer in a world poisoned by hatred and ravaged by war."
