Havana University Closed as
Student Strife Kills
Sixth Person.

HAVANA, Nov. 29 (U. P.).—Havana University was closed today for an investigation into the fatal shooting yesterday of Prof. Raoul Fernandez Fiallo, on the school grounds.

Fiallo was the sixth person killed in the last six months as a result of student strife. The University will remain closed until Jan. 7. Fiallo taught commercial science. He had been a candidate for Senator of the Cuban Revolutionary Party in the last elections, and only Wednesday had written letters and papers denying accusations that he was protecting the "bonche," an allegedly Communist student faction.

He had been a close friend of ex-President Ramon Grau San Martin, and had been active in the 1933 revolution which ousted Gerardo Machado.

Fiallo was shot by three unidentified youths who fled in an automobile. He drew a pistol to defend himself, but it was knocked from his hand.

WINDSORS PLAN VISIT TO MIAMI

Duchess to Enter Hospital
For Dental Operation
In Two Weeks.

NASSAU, Bahamas, Nov. 29 (U. P.).—The Duke and Duchess of Windsor sail within two weeks for Miami, Fla., where the Duchess will enter a hospital for a major dental operation.

The visit will be "private" and will in no way be connected with the Duke's official position as Governor of the Bahamas, the post which he assumed after leaving France and Spain last summer.

The Duke and Duchess plan to arrive at Miami about Dec. 10. They plan to return here on Dec. 14, without going farther into the United States than Miami.

The operation will be performed by Dr. Horace L. Cartee, an orthodontist and extractionist. The hospital will be selected by Harold Christie, a representative of the Duchess. The Duchess is said to have an impacted tooth.

Both the Duke and Duchess desire the greatest possible privacy during their visit, it was said, and hope that arrangements could be made to make their trip uneventful.

This Couple Prefers Life in Lonely, Snow-Bound Hills

BOISE, Ida., Nov. 29 (U. P.).—Mr. and Mrs. Everett Shine are looking forward to a long, hard winter when they will be cut off from civilization by heavy snow—and will like it.

They both admitted they enjoyed their life of seclusion as they loaded flour, matches, brown sugar, beans, dried fruit, canned vegetables and other supplies for the winter before returning to the snow-bound hills north of Boise.

Living 18 miles from the nearest postoffice doesn't seem to bother the couple, because they feel that life in the wild forest country has solved their economic problems in good style.

Unemployment and pride drove the Shines into the hills to make a living shortly after the depression struck.

He had been a cook but was thrown out of work. Relating their story as they were stocking up for the winter, Mr. Shine said he and his wife collected all their possessions, sold or traded them for equipment to live in the mountains.

During the summer they built a sluice box and panned gold from the hills above Idaho City. With the money they purchased a pair

of dogs and heavy clothing for the winter.

Improvising Daniel Boone headgear by sewing a pair of squirrel skins onto the collar ripped from Mrs. Shine's fur coat, the husband started a trap line. The first winter's trapping was hard because he had to make the rounds on foot.

But the next year his dogs—which he says are a cross between police dogs and timber wolves—had produced a litter of pups which were large enough to draw a sleigh and carry him to his trap lines.

This winter they will keep abreast of world affairs with a battery-powered radio set.

Mrs. Shine, who does not have the ordinary housewife's worry over the meat budget, says it will cost them about \$100 to live through the winter. They will get most of their meat by killing wild animals.

Rent is free, Mrs. Shine pointed out, and they don't need any money for movies or other entertainment. There is plenty of work to keep both busy, prepare the meals, skin and tan hides of animals they trap, and take care of the trap lines. Mrs. Shine runs a short line near the cabin to make "pin money."

"You can have your Boise—or any other city," they both agreed. "We'll take the mountains."

OBJECTOR CHANGES MIND IN PRISON

NEW YORK, Nov. 29 (U. P.).—Angelo Mangiore, who refused to register for the draft, registered today in the Federal Detention Prison here in the hope his 18-month sentence would be shortened.

Mangiore, a 23-year-old assistant janitor at the Labor Temple here, thus became the first registration objector in the nation to change his mind after sentence had been passed upon him.

Mangiore was given the 18-month sentence last Wednesday after a stormy argument with Federal Judge Vincent L. Liebell, whose own son, Vincent L. Liebell Jr., 21, volunteered for the army.

In sentencing Mangiore, Judge Liebell told him he would entertain a motion for reduction of sentence if Mangiore would change his mind and register.

REV. W. E. CONKLING IS ELECTED BISHOP

CHICAGO, Nov. 29 (U. P.).—The Rev. Wallace E. Conkling, rector of St. Luke's Episcopal Church, Germantown, Pa., yesterday was elected bishop of the Chicago Diocese, spiritual leader of 100,000 Episcopalians of Chicago and northern Illinois.

The Rev. Mr. Conkling, identified with the "high church" group and at 45 the youngest man ever considered for leadership of the rich diocese, was chosen on the second ballot of 106 clergy from the 125 subordinate parishes. The selection was confirmed by the vote of 43 of the 67 lay delegates.

He succeeds the late Bishop George Craig Stewart, who died last May after serving almost 10 years.

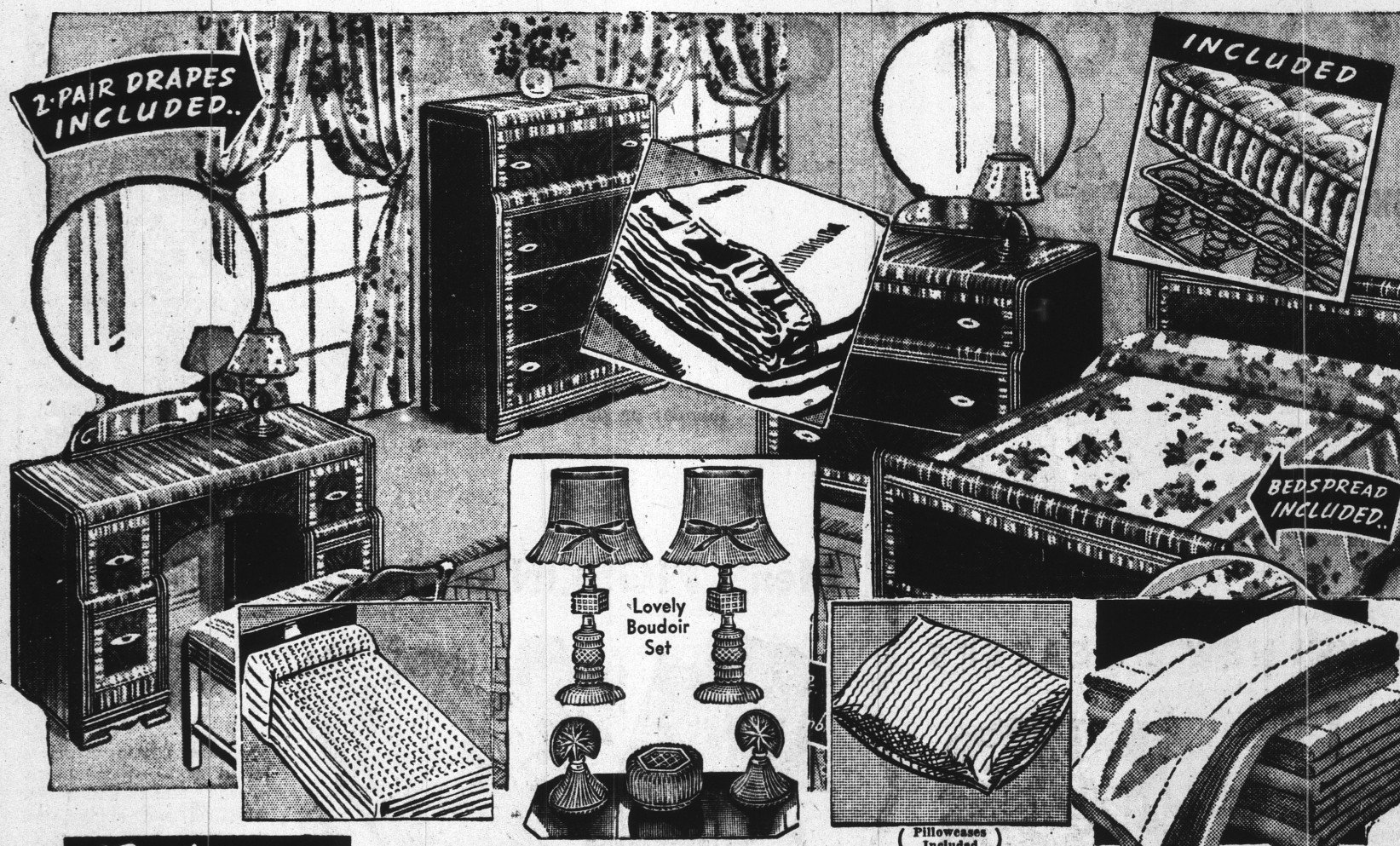
