

WARN AGAINST CONSCRIPTION OF U. S. FACTORIES

Hoffman Tells Forum It Would Bring Ruin on Defense Program.

If American industry is conscripted, our defense program will be hamstrung and ultimate disaster will result, Paul G. Hoffman, president of the Studebaker Corp., declared here last night.

He addressed the executive leadership of the Indianapolis Junior Chamber of Commerce at the Indianapolis Athletic Club. He told the young businessmen that "it is our present task to fortify and strengthen our American system."

"Unless that is done, there is some question in my mind as to whether we will have anything left in this country worth defending."

Acclaims U. S. Policy So Far

He said he was glad to see that, although Congress had enacted a statute enabling the Government to conscript industry, the Government "has not had recourse to that power." He added that the Administration's policy to date "is deserving of acclaim."

But Mr. Hoffman was critical of the possible conscription of industry.

"If our Government conscripts industry, and responsibility for its operation is divided between private management and government officials, stagnation will be the inevitable result. For proof, I point to the railroads during the time they were under Government operation during the last World War."

"Management can be conscripted but you can't conscript brains or enthusiasm. Similarly, labor can be conscripted but you can't conscript morale."

"Within Two Years"

Mr. Hoffman predicted that within two years the combined work of the defense commission and "private industry" will prove whether conscription of industry is necessary.

"I have a very positive belief in the capacity of private industry to build an impregnable defense for America. I have serious doubts about the ability of conscripted management and conscripted labor to do a similar job," he declared.

14 HURT AS TRUCK, STREET CAR CRASH

CHICAGO, Nov. 29 (U. P.)—Fourteen persons were injured, two perhaps seriously, today in a collision between a trailer truck and a surface lines streetcar.

Jack North, 23, South Bend, Ind., driver for the Norwalk Trucking Co., of South Bend, was held by police. He said the truck had swerved out of its northbound traffic lane because of slippery pavement. The truck struck the streetcar almost head-on.

Virginia Steinmetz, 27, a passenger on the streetcar, was taken to the hospital where attendants said she had suffered a possible basal skull fracture. Jennie Buijwit, 25, suffered a brain concussion.

ACCUSED OF URGING DRAFT RESISTANCE

CLEVELAND, Nov. 29 (U. P.)—Lorenz L. Clippinger, 60, Cleveland, was to get a Federal hearing today on charges of violating the Selective Service Law by advising a registrant to evade the draft.

Clippinger, arrested by Federal Bureau of Investigation agents, pleaded not guilty yesterday before U. S. Commissioner B. D. Nicola, Assistant U. S. District Attorney.

"No member of the World Justice Foundation will ever be conscripted into the Army, Navy, marines or air force of the U. S. A. If any member disapproves the above they will be paid \$5000 by the World Justice Foundation."

Francis B. Kavanaugh said Clippinger advised Paul Van Dusen, 33, Berea, O., a registrant, that by payment of \$10 he could become a member of the "World Justice Foundation" and avoid the draft.

Van Dusen, according to officials, received from Clippinger a card which said:

"No member of the World Justice

Foundation will ever be conscripted into the Army, Navy, marines or air force of the U. S. A. If any member disapproves the above they will be paid \$5000 by the World Justice Foundation."

Kin of Hoosiers Killed by Bombs

NEW CASTLE, Ind., Nov. 29

(U. P.)—Word reaching Robert and Sidney Ruddle here today revealed that their uncle, Jack Ruddle, and his wife and daughter were killed Oct. 21 in a night bombing raid on London.
