DEAR JANE JORDAN—I have a problem to which I have given a lot of serious thought and still can't decide for myself. I found out after 15 years of married life that I have a cheat, a liar and a deceitful man for a husband. We have a little business together and he had an affair with one of the girls who work for us. I was painfully hurt when I found out, it took something that I had felt for him from me. Although she is not here now the same thing is going on again with another girl and I have found out again. I have a nice home, money enough to live on and a lovely daughter of 15 who is respected by all. Should I swallow my pride or should I blow up, break up my home and cause my daughter a lot of grief? It is terribly hard for me to face day in and day out. Sometimes I think I can't stand it. He acts like he loves me, but he wants me and his home and other women too.

He takes this woman places while I work. I have friends who tell me they see him with her in our car. I am about ready to walk out of his life forever. If you will advise me I will surely appreciate it.

Answer—To walk out is to admit defeat. A middle-aged woman who breaks up her home is seldom any happier divorced than she was living with the man who deceived her. To go on alone after years of sharing is often more difficult than to put up with deception. Besides, the chances are that your husband simply is going through a phase, as have many other men before him, and when it is over you may be glad that you steadied yourself and him by standing pat.

As you have remarked, you have your daughter to consider. The separation of her parents would be a tremendous blow to her. She would be severely embarrassed by a situation which is not of her making. To be disappointed and disillusioned by her father as the age when it is most important for her to think well of men would do her a serious damage. You and your husband should settle your difficulties between yourselves without involving her.

You need not be a martyr. Blow up if you feel like it, but why walk out without putting up a fight to preserve a relationship which has been satisfactory for 15 years? You have a just grievance and a right to express your wrath. However, there is such a thing as tempering justice with mercy. You can try to understand the man's problem which is not peculiar to him. He isn't the only man to take alarm at the onset of middle age and make a final effort to recapture a few of the thrills of vanishing youth. A little patience on your part may see him through his second adolescence.

Remember that the friends who tell you they saw him with another woman aren't really friends. When they upset you under the guise of kindness they secretly know how they hurt you. Such people remind me more than they hurt you. "You could handle your problem much more wisely without an audience. To be sure it hurts to know that your husband is unfaithful, but it hurts worse to know that other people are aware of his behavior, too. Send the tale-bearers away with their curiosity ungratified.
