More Than 2700 Bridge Parties
To Benefit Symphony Orchestra

MEMBERS OF THE WOMEN'S COMMITTEE of the Indiana State Symphony Society will act as hostesses at the more than 2700 bridge parties to be given in all sections of Indiana between Jan. 20 and Feb. 8 for the benefit of the maintenance fund of the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra. Each party will include from one to 15 tables.

The project, largest in scope ever scheduled by the women's committee, recently was approved by the committee's executive board with Mrs. Charles Latham as president.

Mrs. G. H. A. Clowes, member of the executive board, is general chairman of the tournament. Mrs. William C. Griffith, vice chairman, will assume personal supervision of Indianapolis events, and chairmen appointed in the state will head arrangements in their districts.

"In order to assist toward the financial security of the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra," Mrs. Clowes said, "we have decided upon this method of enlisting the co-operation of every member of our women's committee, which is one of the largest in the country."

Beginning Tuesday, members of Mrs. Griffith's committee will ask each Indianapolis member of the women's committee to invite as many people as possible to play bridge at her home.

Speaking of general arrangements for the tournament, Mrs. Clowes said, "men may be invited to play, according to the wishes of each hostess, but we urge that, as far as possible, women guests be from outside women's committee membership lists."

Prizes will be awarded to high ranking players, and will be provided from the proceeds of the tournament.

The tournament will be played in two divisions in the state—the first round between Jan. 20 to 25 and the semi-final round between Jan. 27 to Feb. 1. There will be no semi-final round for Indianapolis players; bridge parties in this city may be held at any time between Jan. 20 and Feb. 1.

Final play, among the four highest scoring players from the state and the four highest from Indianapolis, will be on the afternoon of Feb. 7 at Mrs. Clowes' residence.

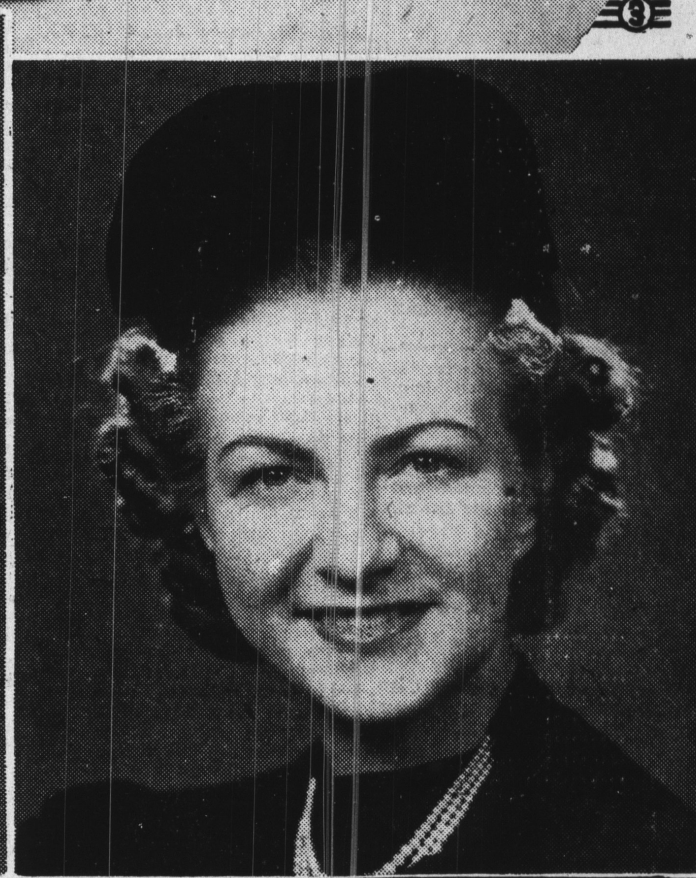
