Not Even the Weatherman's Worst
Halts Activities of Local Horsemen

LOCAL HORSEMEN have their own version of that classic which the Federal postal service uses to characterize its agents. For the dyed-in-the-wool horse lovers hereabouts, it's "neither snow nor rain nor heat nor gloom shall keep us from climbing into the saddle as frequently as possible."

When the weatherman makes the "going" a bit uncomfortable outside, the riders merely adjourn to indoor rings and go right on posting. Or they cluster about clubroom fires and "talk horse."

One group whose interest in horses continues through inclement weather is that which gathers each Monday at the R. H. Brown Stables. Mrs. Feore is completing plans for the riding tournaments for children which she conducts annually at the Brown Stables. The first of five tournaments will be Friday, Jan. 17. The remaining four will be run off one each month through May, finishing before the annual Arlington Horse Show in June.

There will be six classes in the first tournament: One for riders 10 years of age and under; another for riders of from 11 to 14 years of age, and a third for riders from 14 to 18 years of age. Fourth and fifth events will be junior and senior classes of Shortridge High School riders and the final class will be a double bareback event.

A point system will be used in scoring for the tournaments. Blue ribbon winners will receive five points; second place will count three; third place, two, and fourth place, one point.

Riders Anticipate Winter Sports

The little dusting of snow which Indianapolis received this week-end has the habitues of the Brown Stables hoping for more. They look forward to a repeat performance of the ski-joring they did last year. Ski-joring is skiing with a horse, rather than gravity, supplying the motive power.

Algonquin members, too, keep right on riding outdoors if it is at all possible. Even last year's deep snow did not keep them from the hunt course at the club because the snow, being the dry type, did not "ball" on the horses' hooves and prevent riding.
