NINE-TENTHS of the city's high schools are battling above the .500 mark, and if Washington can get started this town will have a fairly presentable over-all season record.

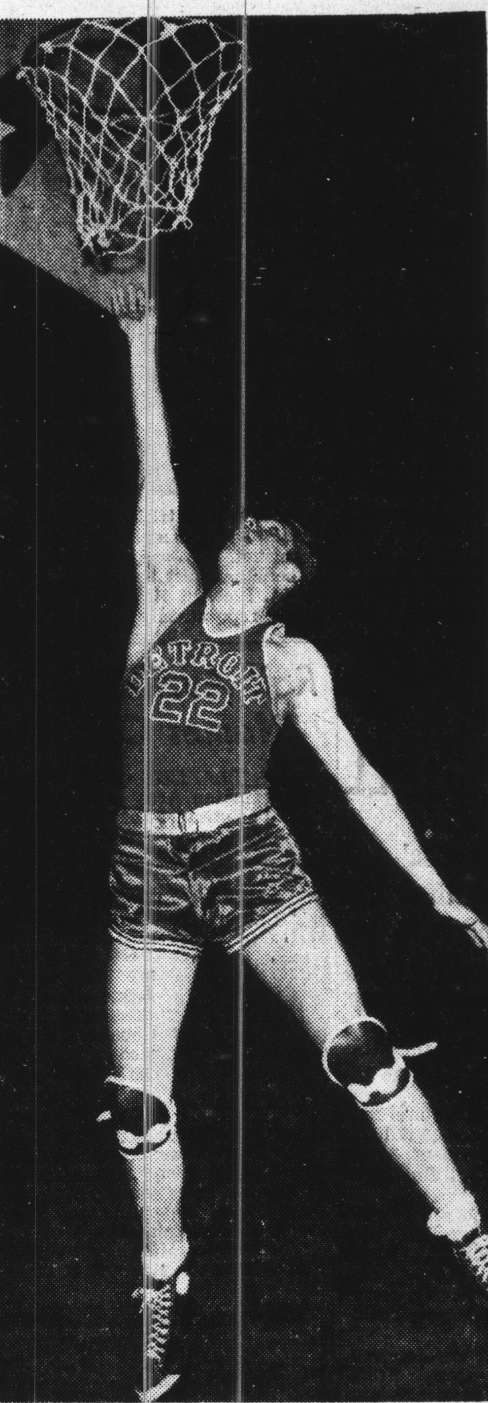

## Chicago U. Wants Grid Games (But Not the Big Ten Kind)

CHICAGO, Jan. 28 (U. P.)—Because the "boys" still want to play football, the University of Chicago is looking for six minor opponents for 1941.

Chicago dropped football at the end of the 1939 season for several important reasons, one of them an 85 to 0 defeat by Michigan.

Last season, however, remnants of the last intercollegiate Maroon squad informally scrimmaged teams from small colleges around the Chicago area and Athletic Director T. Nelson Metcalf said today he hopes to schedule at least six opponents for formal games next fall, because the boys want to keep playing the game.

## LAMONT'S EX-WIFE SUES FOR \$15,000

NEW YORK, Jan. 28 (U. P.)—Papers filed in Supreme Court disclosed today that Robert B. Lamont Jr., son of the former Secretary of Commerce, is being sued by Mrs. Frances Kemp Lamont, described as "my former wife," for return of \$15,000 allegedly loaned to him in 1934.

The litigation was disclosed when Mr. Lamont filed an answer to a suit brought by the Washington, D. C., society woman and sculptor. His answer said he and Mrs. Lamont had been divorced in Denver, Col., in 1937.

Mrs. Lamont's suit for recovery said she loaned Lamont \$15,000 in stocks, securities and bonds in October, 1934, and that he had promised to repay her after the sale of his 15,000-acre Perry Park ranch near Lookout, Col. His answer asked that Mrs. Lamont be examined regarding his claims that he made a final payment of \$10,000 in cash between March and October, 1940.

## Project Television Pictures 60 Feet to Movie Screen

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—Television pictures projected on a theater screen 15 by 20 feet, from a projector in the balcony 60 feet away, were demonstrated here by RCA engineers to show the Federal Communications Commission the latest advances in this field.

In order to use the greatest possible amount of light, a projector is used which is really an astronomical camera of the Schmidt type in Reverse. The 7-inch face of the high voltage kineoscope, on which the picture is formed, faces away from the screen, toward a 30-inch concave mirror. This reflects the image through a glass plate to correct certain faults or aberrations, then to the screen. By the method used for rating camera lenses, the system has a speed of F. 0.7.

The Commission was also shown a home television receiver in which the pictures were projected to a screen 13 1/2 by 18 inches. This used a conventional type of high speed lens, treated, however, with non-reflecting films, to reduce light losses.

Some of the views witnessed were transmitted from the RCA mobile television unit, stationed at Camp Upton on Long Island, 68 miles away. Automatic relays, at Huppauge and Bellmore, picked up the short range signals and passed them along. A new horn type antenna was used to receive them, in the relay towers and finally in a window on the 62d floor of the RCA building.

## WPA IN STATE LOSES 11,000

Drop Reflects Expansion in Industry, Business, Jennings Says.

Approximately 11,000 WPA workers were absorbed into private industry last year as a result of defense expansion, John K. Jennings, State WPA Administrator, announced today.

WPA figures showed that 18,500 persons left WPA rolls last year for private jobs, while 7500 returned to WPA employment. The net 11,000 drop in the rolls reflects rapid business and industrial expansion, Mr. Jennings said.

"Many of the persons who left WPA rolls for private employment during the past two years have been skilled workmen and the demand for skilled workers in Hoosier industrial plants is still heavy," Mr. Jennings said.

"While conditions appear to be changing rapidly, there appear to be no industrial centers where WPA employment can be completely eliminated without working a grave hardship. Private industry is seeking a type of worker no longer to be found on the WPA rolls.

"Rigid physical examinations and strict age limits are against the WPA worker, whose average age is considerably above 40 and whose physical condition often is sub-standard."

## DEMOCRATS TO NAME 2D DISTRICT LEADER

RENSSELAER, Ind., Jan. 28 (U. P.)—Democratic leaders of the Second District meet here tonight to elect a new chairman to succeed George Stevens, Plymouth, who resigned to become Governor Henry F. Schricker's legal adviser.
