FEARS SLASH IN  
GAME RECEIPTS

Gutermuth Opposes Free  
Licenses for All Persons  
60 and Over.

G. R. Gutermuth, acting head of the State Fish and Game Department, today claimed that issuing of fishing, hunting and trapping licenses free to all persons 60 and over would reduce the department's income by more than 15 per cent and restocking activities by 25 per cent.

He issued the statement in connection with a bill now before the Senate and passed by the House that would make such a provision, and said he would urge all members of conservation clubs to take an active part in helping defeat the bill.

Mr. Gutermuth said that a survey of records shows that more than 15 per cent of all permits now sold are sold to persons 60 and over.

Hold Club Contracts

He pointed out that the Fish and Game Division is cut as much as one-fourth, Mr. Gutermuth said, the fish and game restocking would be cut proportionately, and that probably the Department would be unable to renew some contracts with conservation clubs.

"More than 800 conservation clubs in all parts of the State have built enclosures for pheasant and quail at a cost of about \$100 a member," he said. "To repay them, the Conservation Department makes contracts with them to pay the club 75 cents for each bird raised and released by the club.

"The clubs use this money in many ways—some to build and maintain clubhouses, some to build and maintain rifle ranges or skeet fields.

Club Gets Money

The Department also makes contracts with clubs owning fish rearing ponds to pay them stated amounts for so many fingerlings released. No individual collects this money—it must go to the club treasury and be spent as a club.

"This program of aid to clubs would have to be curtailed, as well as the restocking that is done from state game farms.

"Not only that, but the money that now comes to the state for wildlife work through the Pittman-Robertson Act would be proportionately curtailed. This money is allotted to states on the basis of the number of fishing, hunting and trapping permits sold, and any drop in the sales of these would cut Indiana's share, now amounting to many thousands of dollars."

WABASH PROFESSOR  
TO BACK AID BILL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Dr. John D. Tomlinson, professor of political science at Wabash College, will appear before the Senate foreign relations committee Feb. 6 in support of the lend-lease-aid-to-Britain bill, it was announced today.

Dr. Tomlinson, who for many years spent his vacations in League of Nations work at Geneva, has been here last year in favor of the Selective Service Act.

He was one of the founders of the Indiana Committee for Home Defense through aid-to-Britain, which later affiliated with the White committee.

Dr. Tomlinson is expected to contend that the opposition viewpoint expressed by President William C. Dennis of Earlham College before the House foreign affairs committee last week does not represent any unanimous Indiana opinion. His wife is already here working for the bill's passage.

Hoosier Pigeons'  
Service Offered

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Jan. 30 (U. P.)—Members of the South Bend Homing Pigeon Club have offered their 2200 homing pigeons to the Government in the interests of national defense.

The offer was made in a letter to Rep. Robert A. Grant of the Third District. The letter pointed out that "homing pigeons in a defense program or in time of actual war can be an integral cog in military plans," and added that the pigeon had proved its value beyond question in the world War.
