

MARION TALLEY REVEALS 'FEAR'

'Desperately Afraid' to Claim Her Child, She Testifies.

HOLLYWOOD, May 22 (U.P.)—Fear of "embarrassing litigation" kept Marion Talley, former Metropolitan Opera star, from claiming her child for three years. When she finally claimed her daughter, she was "bodily thrown" from the home of her estranged husband's sister.

Miss Talley, who is suing her husband and former voice coach, Adolph Eckstrom, for divorce and custody of her daughter, Susan, 6, testified yesterday that she was "desperately afraid" to claim the child. Miss Talley said she had not seen Susan since a month after her birth in 1935—three weeks after she married Eckstrom.

Finally, she said, she went to Mamaroneck, N.Y., in 1939, to claim Susan, who was living with Mrs. Ruth Nelson, Mr. Eckstrom's sister. "She finally asked me in the house and then phoned Mr. Eckstrom and told him that Marion was here to take the baby," Miss Talley testified.

"After she finished talking, she threw me bodily out of the house."

Model Planes

MUCH DEPENDS ON THERMALS

Spiraling Currents Can Win Or Lose Contests, as Local Fans Can Tell.

Thermals, those spiraling air currents on which model airplanes soar, are funny things. They can win—and sometimes lose—a model airplane contest. The latter is what happened to the Indianapolis pilots at the Anderson meet last Sunday.

Ordinarily there are many thermals from about 9:30 in the morning until 11:30 and from 2:30 p.m. until nearly sundown. When they last all day, long flights usually result, and some planes are jerked right out of sight by them.

James Bennett Sr. had the latter trouble at Anderson. Harold Stofler sent his ship up for a test hop and an hour and a half later still was looking for it.

That same difficulty plagued Eugene Bevington of Lebanon who won second prize and \$15. He only had two flights in posting his time of 30:25 instead of the regular three. His Cleveland Senior Playboy powered with an Ohlsson 60 went up at 9:30 a.m. He didn't find it until 3:30 in the afternoon, too late to complete three flights. Yes, thermals are funny things.

First place in the contest went to William Brothers of New Castle, a member of the Noblesville Model Maniacs. His Zipper with an Ohlsson 23 motor had a best flight of 17:39, a total time of 31:41, winning him \$20.

Devon Bevington of Elkhart chalked up a total time of 29:28 with his Megow Ranger for third place. His best single flight was 20:6. He won \$10.

Fourth place was won by Howard Bonner of Anderson. His Comet Salplane with an Ohlsson 60 power plant soared for a total time of 24:34. His best flight was 12:16.5.

Charles Keeling of Louisville with his Bunch-powered Zipper flew for 24 minutes 13 seconds, his best single flight being 12:51.


