

12 LOSE LIVES IN STATE TRAFFIC

Local Boy Among Victims, Raising Year's Accident Toll to 64.

Twelve persons were killed in week-end Indiana traffic, one of them in Indianapolis. The local fatality raised the year's toll here to 64, which is 17 more than last year at this time.

The dead:

RUSSELL WILLOUGHBY, 9, of 702 N. Linwood Ave., who was killed when his bicycle came from an alley in the 700 block Bosart Ave. and collided with a truck.

HAROLD VERON, 25, of 1136 College Ave., and **GEORGE ENGLE**, 55, of Emmingham, Ill., who were killed in a three-car crash yesterday on Road 36 north of Greencastle. Maria Willis, Terre Haute, was driver of the car and was not seriously injured.

MR. AND MRS. R. F. GAITHER, Minerva, Ky., and **MRS. ROBERT COE**, of Bath, were killed in a head-on crash 12 miles east of Connersville yesterday. Mr. Gaither was postmaster of Minerva.

JOHN KRUSE, 72, Muncie, died yesterday of injuries received Saturday night when the bus in which he was a passenger skidded on a wet pavement and crashed into a tree at Muncie.

Cyclist Is Killed

WILBUR ORR, 21, Detroit, was killed Saturday night in a two-car crash eight miles south of Angola on Road 77.

JAMES FREDERICK NEMAR, 60, of near Bedford, was killed Saturday night when his car and a truck collided on Road 5 near Logansport.

OLIVER DAILEY, 31, Marion, was killed Saturday when his motorcycle struck a post at Jonesborough.

STANLEY GLEVA, 17, Mishawaka, was killed Sunday when his bicycle struck a passenger train in Mishawaka.

EMMA BOWSER, 16, Lafayette, died today of injuries she received Saturday in a crash on Road 25 near Delphi.

Dies in Ambulance

The Willoughby boy received a concussion when his bicycle struck the rear fender of the truck and he died in an ambulance on the way to St. Vincent's Hospital.

The truck was driven by Edwin H. Voll, 37, of 5703 E. Washington St., a special delivery messenger.

The boy is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William F. Willoughby; a brother, William Jr., and a sister, Phyllis.

Funeral services will be at 2 p. m. tomorrow at the home, and burial will be in Maple Lawn Cemetery, Ellettsfield.

Mr. Potest's candidacy is being sponsored by the Temples of North and South Carolina. Mr. Baldwin is backed by the Florida Temples.

A college professor and author, Mr. Potest is past potentate of Sudan Temple and past grand master of the North Carolina Grand Lodge of Masons. In the winter he is a professor at Wake Forest College and in the summer he teaches at Columbia University.

Mr. Potest is an authority on the classics, having written seven books on the subject. In his college days at Wake Forest he became the first southern intercollegiate tennis champion. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and is an executive councillor of Kappa Alpha.

Other in Business

Mr. Baldwin is a business executive in Jacksonville and is past potentate of Morocco Temple, the oldest temple in the South. He is a war veteran, and was wounded during the Marine's charge in Belleau Wood.

He is director of the Hope Tavern Foundation for Crippled Children, the largest such organization in Florida. He also is director of the Children's Home Society of Florida.

Mr. Baldwin is a Rotarian and charter member of the Jacksonville Junior Chamber of Commerce. He directed the Jacksonville Community Chest campaign two years. He also is a member of the Duval County defense commission.

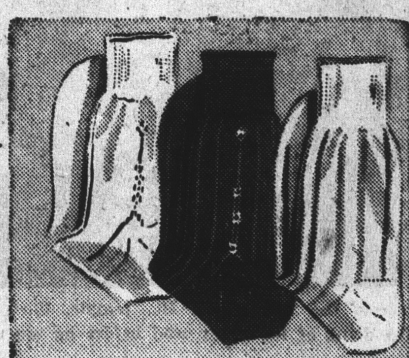

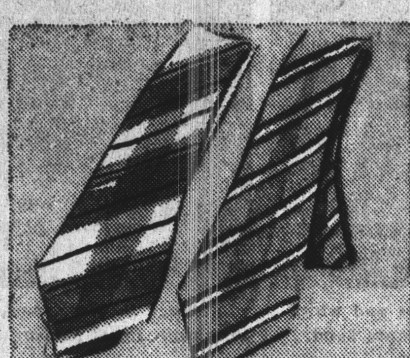

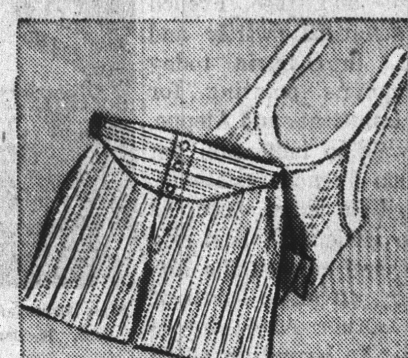
