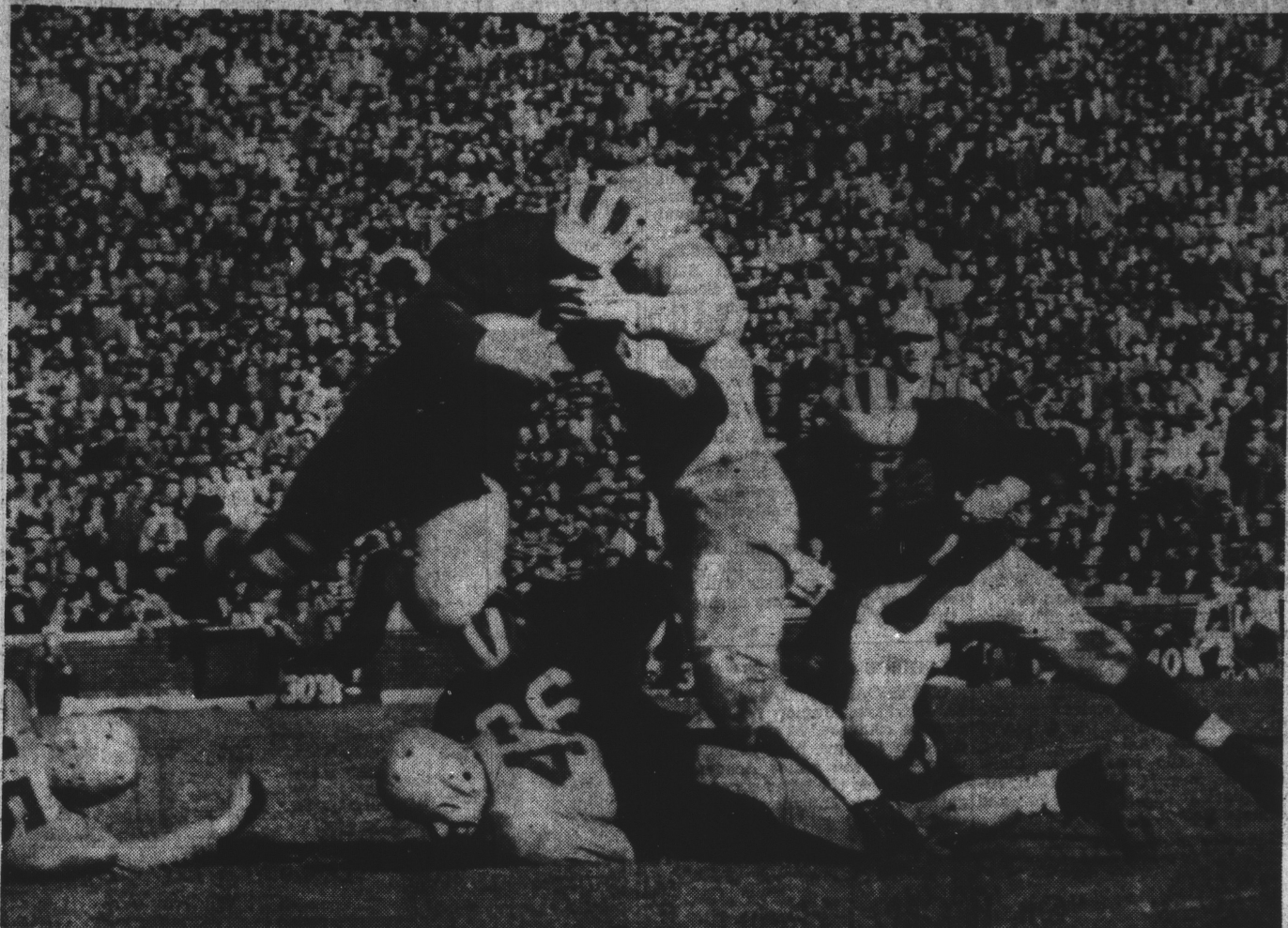

Frankie Albert Runs From Own Territory on 4th Down

NEW YORK, Oct. 27—Monday grid-iron:

HERO OF THE WEEK—Frankie Albert, Stanford's all-America quarterback, who set up one touchdown with a 47-yard run, kicked a point after touchdown and ran his team with great daring and skill.

He was the difference between two good football teams—Stanford and Washington—and most of the credit for Stanford's 13-to-7 victory goes to him.

Albert defied all the instructions of all the football coaches who ever lived by running on fourth down occasionally when the ball was in Stanford territory.

UPSET OF THE WEEK—Oklahoma's clean-cut 16-to-6 victory over Santa Clara. All the hope so far this season has been that Santa Clara had a real power house that could not be stopped. Oklahoma, which usually turns out a good team, was supposed to be below par.

In behalf of Santa Clara, the alibi is offered that the game was played in a heavy rain and the West Coast boys set up Oklahoma touchdowns by fumbling.

The alibi is hereby disregarded. A communique from Norman, Okla., states that the rain was falling on all parts of the grid-iron, that the Oklahoma boys got just as wet as the warriors from Santa Clara and that the ball was equally slippery for both sides.

Only 12 Major Elevens Remain in Unbeaten Ranks

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—The South and the East took command of the race for the mythical national football championship today as eight more major powers were marked up among the survivors of the stormiest week-end of the season.

The visitors handed Evansville its fourth defeat of the season.

With four weeks of action ahead, here are the survivors of the first half of a season which has leveled the ranks of the mighty in what appears to be record time for the course:

THE SOUTH—Texas, Texas A. & M., Texas Tech, Duke and Vanderbilt.

THE EAST—Fordham, Pennsylvania, Temple, Army and Duquesne.

THE MIDLANDS—Minnesota and Notre Dame.

Bigger Stuff

CHICAGO, Oct. 27 (U. P.).—The Big Nine is on its way toward an all-time attendance record in football.

Already a total of 1,035,403 spectators have paid their way into 27 conference games, an average of 38,348 per game. In 1940, the record year, an average of 37,498 saw the complete schedule and at this same stage of the campaign the average was well under 35,000.

Michigan's record attendance of 85,753 for Minnesota last week was the largest ever to see a conference game. In addition, Northwestern played before 71,896 at Ohio State. A crowd of 33,000 saw Indiana at Wisconsin and 22,000 watched Iowa at Purdue.

That's the complete list and the signs of sectional strength are clearly marked. Of the even dozen teams, five belong to Dixie and five more to the Atlantic seaboard. To make the case even more complete, the only two major teams which have not been defeated but are tied also belong in the same divisions—Mississippi State in the South and Navy in the East.

The squads joining the hundreds of other hapless clubs already cut down were Santa Clara, Clemson, Ohio State, Michigan, Detroit, Villanova, Rutgers and Navy—the latter losing its honor position through a scoreless tie. In all but two cases—those of Rutgers and Michigan—the defeats were 24-carat upsets.

Here are the developments by sections:

THE SOUTHWEST—This conference gets banner billing for the might of its two top teams, Texas Aggies and Texas U. who became the nation's leading scorers by crumpling Baylor and Rice, 48-0 and 46-0.

They have scored 206 and 196 points respectively and are tied in conference standings with two victories and no defeats. Outside the conference, Texas Tech retained its perfect record, too, by whipping New Mexico, 46-0, while thrice-beaten Arkansas knocked over unbeaten Detroit, 9-6.

THE MIDLANDS—Minnesota took a clear lead in the Western Conference by shading Michigan, 7-0, in the day's top game, and thereby retained its position as one of the nation's foremost elevens.

Notre Dame humiliated Illinois, 49-14, for its sixth straight triumph, and Duquesne upset Marquette, 31-14. Oklahoma toppled Santa Clara, 16-6, and Tulsa defeated Oklahoma A. & M., 16-0.

THE EAST—Fordham continued atop the independents and Penn atop the Ivy League. The Rams repelled Texas Christian, 28-14, and Penn whacked Maryland, 55-6. Army fashioned its longest winning streak in years by upsetting Columbia, 13-0, while Navy's guns were spiked, 0-0, by Harvard. Penn now has a wide lead in the Ivy League, while Dartmouth defeated Yale, 7-0, and Cornell topped Colgate, 21-2.

THE SOUTH—In the Southeastern Conference, Alabama defeated Georgia, 27-14; Georgia Tech defeated Auburn, 28-14; Mississippi surprisingly whipped Tulane, 20-18, and L. S. U. toppled Florida, 10-7.

In the Southern conference, William and Mary went into a tie with Duke for the lead by defeating George Washington, 48-0. Furman, Wake Forest, VPI and VMI all advanced successfully.

THE PACIFIC COAST—Stanford was the only team to survive a wave of upsets, defeating Washington, 13-7, to take the lead in the Coast Conference and Rose Bowl scramble. Both Oregon teams had their hopes smashed, Oregon by UCLA, 14-7, and State by Washington State, 14-0. California upset Southern California, 14-0.
