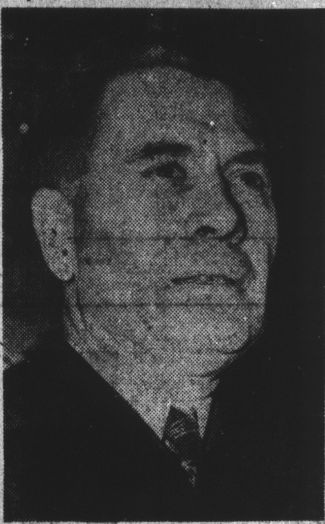


BILL IN SENATE

Mr. Roosevelt was said to have

President of the United States or  
John L. Lewis."  
Leaders of both Houses were con-  
fident that defense labor legislation

decisive action. Rep. E. E. Cox (D.  
Ga.), appealed to the people to put

OPEN COLLEGES  
FOR ADULT USE

Educators Approve Plan for  
Mine Information  
Centers in State.

(Times Special)  
BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Oct. 22.—Adults who are confused by today's complex problems soon may be able to use the resources of nine Indiana colleges and universities. Representatives of the schools, at a meeting here yesterday, generally approved a program which is being set in motion by the United States Office of Education to make these information centers available to the public.  
Dr. F. J. Kelly, chief of the division of higher education in the Office of Education, suggested establishment of special libraries or information at these centers for the public's use.

Plan Program Expansion  
Dr. Herman B. Wells, Indiana University president, was delegated to appoint a committee of three college and university presidents to plan the program further, to inform heads of institutions not represented at the meeting, and to call a future meeting.  
Those present at the meeting voted to support the project without resorting to use of Federal funds.  
Participating in the conference were Dr. Ralph W. Tiley, president of Indiana State Teachers' College; Dr. William F. McCann, president of Marion College; Prof. George E. Davis of Purdue University; Dr. Lincoln B. Hale, president, and R. E. Olmsted, executive secretary of Evansville College; W. E. Waggoner, controller of Ball State Teachers' College; Dr. William C. Dennis, president of Earlham College; Dr. V. F. Schwalm, president-elect of Manchester College; Dr. Frank Hugh Sparks, Wabash College president, and Dr. Wells.

utterances, and that all this comes from the forgers' workshop of American Jews, with whom the United States people have as little in common as other decent people.  
"It will be a matter for the United States people, now or in future, to judge the policy and methods of the man who, as the head of a criminal clique, is trying to drag the American people into war and plow under America's sons and the fathers of American children on the battlefields of Europe, solely in the service of his own lust and power."  
Are Nazis Uneasy  
Over Spain, France?

The Germans did not indicate the exact motives behind their shifting propaganda line and unprecedented wrath.

However, it appeared possible that it might stem from uneasiness over the reaction to the Roosevelt charges in such countries as Italy, France and Spain where Germany has attempted to make political capital of her assumed role as a defender against "atheist bolshevism."  
In each of these countries the Catholic Church is a factor of major importance. Nazi relations with Catholicism within Germany have long been troubled and any wide acceptance of Mr. Roosevelt's charge of unprovoked Nazi intentions toward religion might well arouse difficulties for the Germans in the Catholic countries.

Mr. Roosevelt, through his personal envoy, Myron C. Taylor, has conducted negotiations of extremely confidential nature with His Holiness Pope Pius XII in the last two months and possible parallel activity by American diplomats in France and Spain has been hinted. There has been no revelation from any source as to the nature of the Roosevelt-Vatican conferences but the high pitch of Nazi anger at Mr. Roosevelt's statements might indicate fear that the evidence referred to by the chief executive has played some part in American diplomatic activity.

Enemy Propaganda  
"It is obvious that the whole allegation of nothing more nor less than the fabrication of enemy propaganda, which put it into Roosevelt's mouth," an informant said. "One sees quite clearly that Roosevelt's objective is not only to create unrest among the German people but an attempt to scare the South Americans and mobilize the church throughout the world against Germany. We are thoroughly familiar with such tricks, which can best be described as 'a frame up.' "Roosevelt must not people's intelligence very low to feed them these cock and bull stories. We know who is the aggressor and who stands behind all these scandalous

to the dictates of fables. We have to abandon the tortoise as a national symbol."  
The Daily Mail carried an eight-column headline: "Roosevelt: 'Shooting Begun.' " A sub-head said: "Damn the torpedoes—full speed ahead."  
The Express headline said: "Roosevelt says the shooting has started: Hitler's torpedo at the Navy was fired at every American but damn the torpedoes, full speed ahead."

The Daily Sketch said: "American opinion hardens from day to day. There are signs that the American people are inclined to follow those whose business it is to use all the information at their disposal, to advise them."

Tokyo  
TOKYO, Oct. 22 (U. P.).—A spokesman of the Cabinet Information Board refused to comment today on President Roosevelt's Navy Day speech.  
Informed observers said the Japanese would "calmly read the speech and watch future developments."  
Newspapers displayed the speech prominently under headlines of which Yomiuri's was typical: "Already Taken Battle Stations." Yomiuri said the speech was equivalent to a declaration of war against Germany.

Mexico  
MEXICO CITY, Oct. 22 (U. P.).—Alejandro Carrillo, liberal member of the Chamber of Deputies, today characterized President Roosevelt's Navy Day address as "historic" and probably the most important statement he has made thus far regarding the war.  
Carrillo expressed belief that "without the slightest doubt" Nazi fifth columns, particularly in Argentina, Chile, Bolivia, Panama and Mexico were working toward an objective to dominate Latin America as demonstrated by Mr. Roosevelt.

FAVORS REJECTION  
OF HOUSING BIDS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 (U. P.).—Col. Lawrence Westbrook, special assistant to Federal Works Administrator John M. Carmody, said today he would recommend the rejection of all bids on a defense housing project at Wayne, Mich., including the low bid of F. J. Currier.

Testifying before the Senate committee investigating national defense, Mr. Westbrook, in charge of defense housing construction, said he believed an OPM recommendation against award of the contract to Mr. Currier should be followed. Mr. Currier was the low bidder on the project by an amount variously stated from \$216,000 to \$431,000.  
"If OPM makes recommendations to any agency engaged in defense activities, I feel those recommendations should be carried out," Mr. Westbrook said.

VICHY ABOLISHES UNIONS  
VICHY, Oct. 22 (U. P.).—The Government abolished all political and secretariat trade unions today and ordered all French employers and workers alike to join new Government-controlled labor "corporations." Strikes and lockouts were outlawed and arbitration was made compulsory under the new labor statute, which was published in the Official Journal after 15 months' work by French labor experts.

**TRAINMEN CALL FOR NEUTRALITY REPEAL**

Calling for bold and prompt action by Congress and the President, Bill Lee Lodge 608 of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, has adopted a resolution calling for repeal of the Neutrality Act.

In the resolution signed by the lodge president, Leonard W. Carpenter, the group expressed the opinion that if the Nazis win the war they will control world trade lines, dominate South American countries and destroy the American way of life.

The resolution continued: "Therefore, be it resolved by Bill Lee Lodge 608 of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, that the United States must act more boldly and promptly in the future than in the past and that Congress must speed and encourage the President in such actions, and

"Further, be it resolved that at this time the entire Neutrality Act be repealed."
