

PROTEST ARMY PLANT CONTROL

**Air Associates Group of
Employees Takes Plea
To President.**

BENDIX, N. J., Dec. 2 (U. P.).—Removal of Army control of Air Associates, Inc. was demanded today by a group of employees, in a petition forwarded to President Roosevelt and congressional leaders.

The signers, claiming to represent 85 per cent of the firm's workers, also sought repudiation of an agreement under which former president F. Leroy Hill and other officers were to be removed from the plant was turned back to stockholders. There were 500 signatures, said to be those of 500 employees.

"It is our sincere belief that anything less than a prompt acquiescence to this petition will constitute a flagrant violation of the Constitution of this great nation and a transgression on the rights of its free citizens," the petition said.

The employees charged Mr. Roosevelt was "badly misinformed" when he "allowed the Army . . . to impose the will of a minority of 15 per cent of the employees of the company on the majority of 85 per cent."

The petitioners assertedly "ensured the abuse and vilification of the small minority of striking employees and their imported troublemakers for weeks. We fought to protect our right to work against their violent efforts to stop us."

Charging a surrender by state and local authorities to "the imported troublemakers," the employees said "they kept production going 'at grave personal risk,' because they believed the 'minority was selling out' this country's interest to gain its selfish ends."

Howler Monkeys Improve On Society's Foreign Policy

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—Howler monkeys have better foreign policy and scheme of international relations than science has yet taught man to use, Dr. Edward L. Thorndike, eminent educational psychologist of Teachers College, Columbia University, said here.

At a luncheon meeting of the Psychological Corp. honoring its founder, Dr. James McKeen Cattell, pioneer psychologist, Prof. Thorndike said:

"The howler monkeys manage the matter as follows: For the most part, each nation stays in its own territory, minding its own business.

"If one nation encroaches upon another's territory, the invaded nation meets them with a vigorous attack of howls.

"The invaders howl back.

"The contest continues until, by a beneficent provision in the brain of the howler monkey, the side that is out-howled is moved to retire. Not a drop of blood is spilt; not an atom of food or shelter is destroyed. No blot stains the national honor, since each citizen howls his loudest until his inner nature says 'Hold, enough!' or 'Howled enough!'

"The absolute justice of this procedure is dubious, since there may be a very low correlation between rightful ownership and vociferousness. But the outcomes are surely far better than in man, where the large wins over the small, the bellicose over the peaceful, and force over reason.

"It is an elementary principle of psychology that we should not try to dam up and push back the energy and passions of men, but should rather direct and entice them into desirable channels. It has been the world's tragedy of the last half century that effort was not made and ways were not found to encourage the energy and ambitions of the German people and of their rulers toward lines of action that would benefit the world and for the rest of the world.

"It is perhaps impertinent to suggest that our governments should study psychology. But I can at least recommend that psychology study the governments.

"If we do the work we should do in that field, we may hope to see psychologists attached to the Department of State."

U. S. TAX TOTAL GAINS IN STATE

**Collection of Excise Levy
During November Tops
20 Million.**

New Federal excise taxes which became effective Oct. 1 were responsible for most of the \$7,600,000 increase in U. S. revenues in Indiana during November over the same month a year ago.

Will H. Smith, U. S. Collector of Internal Revenue for Indiana, said total collections last month were \$20,800,000 and that of this amount, \$18,090,000 was from the new retail and entertainment taxes along with the old miscellaneous taxes.

Social security tax collections last month, including old age benefits and Federal unemployment taxes, were \$1,786,000, an increase of \$926,000 over the same month a year ago.
