

## PROTEST ARMY PLANT CONTROL

Air Associates Group of Employees Takes Plea To President.

BENDIX, N. J., Dec. 2 (U. P.)— Removal of Army control of Air Associates, Inc. was demanded today by a group of employees, in a petition forwarded to President Roosevelt and congressional leaders.

The signers, claiming to represent 55 per cent of the firm's workers, also sought repudiation of an agreement under which former president F. Leroy Hill and other officers were to be removed before the plant was turned back to stockholders. There were 500 signatures, said to be those of 500 employees.

"It is our sincere belief that anything less than a prompt acquiescence to this petition will constitute a flagrant violation of the Constitution of this great nation and a transgression on the rights of its free citizens," the petition said.

The employees charged Mr. Roosevelt was "badly misinformed" when he "allowed the Army . . . to impose the will of a minority of 15 per cent of the employees of the company on the majority of 85 per

The petitioners assertedly "en- mured the abuse and vilification of the small minority of striking employees and their imported troublemakers for weeks. We fought to protect our right to work against their violent efforts to stop us."

Charging a surrender by state and local authorities to the "imported troublemakers," the employees said they kept production going "at grave personal risk," because they believed the "minority was 'sell- ing out' this country's interest to gain its selfish ends."

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## U. S. TAX TOTAL GAINS IN STATE

Collection of Excise Levy During November Tops 20 Million.

New Federal excise taxes which became effective Oct. 1 were responsible for most of the \$7,800,000 increase in U. S. revenues in Indiana during November over the same month a year ago.

Will H. Smith, U. S. Collector of Internal Revenue for Indiana, said total collections last month were \$20,800,000 and that of this amount, \$18,000,000 was from the new retail and entertainment taxes along with the old miscellaneous taxes.

Sozial security tax collections last month, including old age benefits and Federal unemployment taxes were \$1,786,000, an increase of \$926,000 over the same month a year ago.
