

2266 Now Clothed; RCA Union Takes 95

Cash from Allison Plant Nears \$1000 Mark; Stark & Wetzel Employees Care for 36.

The number of children clothed in The Times Clothe-A-Child campaign today moved to 2266.

Headlining the list of direct clothing donors were the employees and members of the local Electrical Workers' Union (B-1048), who cared for 95 children last night.

Other large donors were the employees of Stark & Wetzel who took 36, Block's employees, who took 20, as did National Malleable and Al-lislon Maintenance employees.

The cash contributors' list was topped by an \$511.65 donation from the Assembly & Inspection and Finished Stores from Allison's. Other Allison departments also were large donors and the day's report showed a total of \$979.50 from Allison departments, not including direct clothing by other groups from the same plant.

LEGAL AID PLEDGED TO BOOER OF F. D. R.

CHICAGO, Dec. 23 (U. P.) — Lawyers representing the National Lawyers Guild and the Civil Liberties Union charged today that a welder fined \$200 for boozing President Roosevelt was a victim of "war hysteria" and announced they would carry the case to the Supreme Court, if necessary.

The welder was Edward A. Loss, Jr., 23, who was attacked by spectators in a newsreel theater for boozing a shot of the President. Judge Oscar S. Caplan, who assessed the fine, that he was a Republican and had boozed "automatically."

Sol and Irving Friedman, attorneys retained by the Civil Liberties Union and the Lawyers Guild, sought a review of the case. Judge Caplan, who first said Loss' offense "bordered on treason," announced a jail guard reported the youth had shouted "Heil Hitler" in his cell.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur is All Soldier, Gen. Tyndall Declares

There is one comforting thing for Americans to remember as they read the news of the major Japanese attack on the Philippines, Maj. Gen. Robert S. Tyndall, retired, says.

In Gen. Douglas MacArthur, the U. S. A. has the "best man that could have been found anywhere to lead our forces in that struggle," he said.

General Tyndall knows General MacArthur well. He served both with and under him for 22 months in the Rainbow Division in France during World War I and he has had frequent contacts with him since, especially during the time General MacArthur was chief of

staff of the U. S. Army.

"General MacArthur is all soldier," General Tyndall said. "He's all that these magazine pieces have said that he is."

"He's brilliant and he's a fighter."

"I don't know what equipment he has on the islands, but there is one thing certain, and that is that he will use every piece at his command to the best possible advantage," the general said.

There are several stories of General MacArthur's bravery going the rounds since his reappearance in the news spotlight and General Tyndall has one of his own to add.

One time during the St. Mihiel offensive in France, he recalled, General MacArthur occupied an old chateau for his post command which was directly behind the main line of resistance and directly in front of his support.

"The news of MacArthur's closeness to the front spread among the troops and had a very good effect

on their morale," General Tyndall said.

"Of course," he added, "it was not a wise position to hold since it was naturally a good target. Another officer and I went to him and advised him to get out."

"MacArthur looked at us and said, 'You men are both artillerymen and I'll tell you the enemy won't have a bracket on this building yet. But when they do, I'll get out.'"

He got out of the chateau a short time later and it was only little while before enemy shells dropped on the building, General Tyndall recalled.

General MacArthur will fight for his men and his divisions just as hard as we will fight the enemy," the general said.

"MacArthur helped form the Rainbow Division and soon after we got to France they started taking men from the Rainbow Division for replacements," the general said.

"MacArthur went straight to Pershing and the order taking men from the Rainbow Division was canceled."

The Philippine commander's hero is his father, Gen. Arthur MacArthur, another great American soldier, General Tyndall added.

"It made no difference where he was or what the circumstances were," he reminisced. "MacArthur would always have a 4x6 photograph of his father hanging some place close to him."

He has a great flair for dress and oftentimes he violated Army regulations in the wearing of his uniforms, General Tyndall said.

One time, he recalled, MacArthur was captured by a company of our own troops in France. The cap he was wearing looked like a German's.

"Yes sir," General Tyndall mused. "MacArthur's a soldier. If he goes down there, he'll go down fighting."

HEARING GRANTED IN SABOTAGE CASE

EVANSVILLE, Ind., Dec. 23 (U. P.) — A preliminary hearing has been granted by U. S. Commissioner Edward Frick to Kenneth Harris, 34, Evansville, who was arrested Friday by FBI agents on a charge of sabotage.

The hearing, set for 10 a. m. Dec. 27, may force FBI officials to reveal evidence, or produce witnesses, to support the charge that Harris allegedly made or caused to be made defective tools used in defense contract production.

Harris was employed as a machinist at the Faultless Castor Corp. in Evansville until a week ago. He is married and the father of five children.
