

## Big Ten Divides Into 'Haves' And 'Have Nots,' With Indiana In 'Win or Else' Fight Tonight

Wildcats, Gophers Meet In Big Game Tonight

The Big Ten basketball race was divided into the "haves" and the "have nots" today with additional fast breaks developments planned for this evening.

The "have a victory" teams were Purdue, Minnesota, Illinois, Northwestern and Iowa. Indiana and Wisconsin were not listed in the "win column" but the defending champion Badgers and the runner-up Hoosiers were not discounted.

One of the two was sure to enter the good side tonight when they tangle at Bloomington. Originally booked as a early race test of Conference power the game was changed now into a victory-or-else-battle. A team might not be able to offset two straight losses in this loop.

The big game of this evening matches unbeaten Minnesota and sophomore-studded Northwestern. The Irish of Notre Dame can brag of Wildcat victory but they are alone in that class. Indiana lost to them Saturday night, 50 to 40.

All the members of Purdue's hoopla circus loaded and looped through seldom-scoring Chicago, 64 to 18. Minnesota kept up its 50-points a game average by swamping Ohio State, 56 to 42, while Iowa handed Michigan a defeat, 40 to 34.

Illinois became a team to watch along side Minnesota and Northwestern by toppling the Badgers, 55 to 40.

The sophomores appeared to be taking up in basketball right where they left off in football—as the big shots.

Northwestern's Otto Graham proved his metal against Indiana by one-handing 15 points in the second half for the Wildcats while Illinois had four second-year men in her line-up that beat the Badgers.

The loss of Capt. Andy Zimmer in the last half by the foul route hurt the Hoosiers. They had battled evenly in the first period with a 20 to 19 half-time score favoring the Wildcats. But as Graham went up so Zimmer went out.

Indiana may find a different Wisconsin five. They miss big Gene Englund but Johnny Kots couldn't get going against Illinois' fast break. He scored 13 points but that isn't many for Johnny.

The Boilermakers used 17 players against the Maroons and 13 scored. Michigan may be a little tougher but they are very tall to be running along side the Purdue "fire wagon."

While the Boilermakers were yawning and cutting off 28 Maroon passes the Wolverines were losing to the Hawkeyes in the smallest point total game of the night. Guard Leo Doyle led the scoring with 11. Purdue's Forrest Sproll got 16 points in the few minutes he was in.

Minnesota vs. Northwestern. Capt. Don Smith of the Gophers paced his teammates against Ohio State with 15 points but they pass the scoring around, just like the football team. A fast break dashed the Buckeyes except for a few minutes when four sophomores were running for Ohio.

The Waukegan Wonder, Mr. Graham, could only get one point in the first half against Indiana, but turned on in the second. Clason and Wendlund were often in the scoring list.

Iowa at Chicago probably means a second Hawkeye victory. Vic Siegel paced the Iowa men against Michigan with 11 points. Chicago's mere 19 against Purdue classifies them rather low in the loop.

Illinois and Ohio State are idle tonight. The Illini's Badger defeat stamps them as the big contender while Ohio State with footballer Dick Fisher going may develop. Minnesota was pretty terrific. They hit 18 out of 21 free throws.
