Red Cross classes have been started at Rhodius, Northwestern, Northeastern, Brookside and South Side Community Centers, according to Recreation Director H. W. Mid-dleworth.

Jackie W. Joseph, Board president, suggested that the centers might be used by the Red Cross and other agencies for distribution of materials incident to defense work.

Board members suggested that music leaders be asked to donate their services in directing community singing as a feature of family night programs and other community affairs.

HITCHCOCK TO HELP MAP DRAFT POLICY
