In Terre Haute.

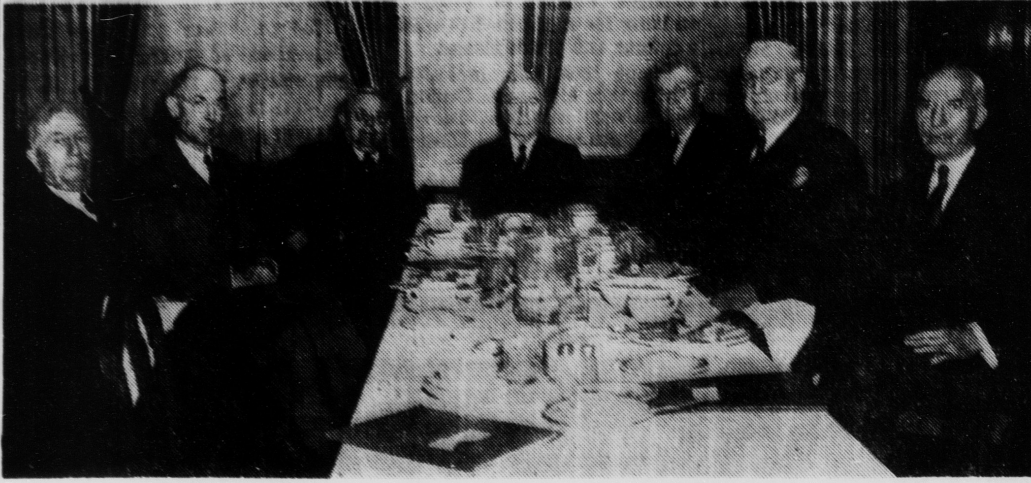
