Helpful Pointers on Preparing Church Suppers and Club Teas

THE SEASON for church suppers and club teas is in full swing and the committees whose task it is to prepare and serve large-quantity meals face a man-sized job.

But it is a job that can be speeded and simplified if menus are planned to include foods which can be cooked and served easily. Following are some helpful pointers on preparation:

A pound of tea will make 100 cups of tea.

A pound of coffee will make 40 cups.

A quart of cream will serve 35 to 40 persons with cream for coffee.

Twenty pounds of old potatoes or 13 pounds of new potatoes, with 4 quarts of white sauce, will make 50 portions of creamed potatoes.

Ten pounds of large potatoes will make 3 pounds of potato chips or 50 portions.

Between 3 and 4 gallons of punch will make 100 servings.

Three gallons of ice cream will make 100 servings.

Later in the year, when new peas and strawberries are cheap enough for large-scale menus, here are two things to remember:

One bushel of well-filled green peas will yield 8 quarts when shelled and 50 good-sized portions.

One quart of strawberries combined with ice cream will serve 8 or will make four large portions served alone.

Tips on cooking the foods:

Cook delicately flavored vegetables covered.

Cook strong flavored vegetables such as onions or cabbage, uncovered.

Add salt to vegetables after they begin boiling to retain color.

Pour vegetable puree into white sauce when combining cream soups.

Cook white sauce until the raw taste of flour is no longer detected.

The Question Box

Q—I am planning to spend a month in Florida in February or March and would like some suggestions about the type of clothing to take.

A—A jacket dress or a summer suit or both, if you have them; one sports coat; one or two pairs of slacks; as many short sets as you usually have in summer; a bathing suit; six day dresses, some of them crepe and some cotton; two dinner frocks with wrap or jacket, and a formal evening gown. And, of course, all the accessories for these dresses and costumes.

Q—When boiling rice, how much water is needed for each cup of rice?

A—Two quarts.

A—Dust them frequently, and occasionally clean them with paste floor wax, rubbing the wax generously over the surface. Let stand for an hour, then rub briskly with flannel or a soft brush.




