

LAUDS WAR USE OF SULFA DRUGS

Honolulu Doctor Reports Drop in Brain Wound Mortality.

CHICAGO, Jan. 22 (U. P.). — A Honolulu physician who attended the wounded after the Pearl Harbor attack predicted today that use of sulfonamide drugs would prove an important factor in reduction of brain wound mortality during the war.

Dr. Ralph B. Cloward, writing in the Journal of the American Medical Association, said brain operations were postponed as much as 24 to 36 hours because of the large number of cases requiring treatment.

He said infection was avoided in these cases through proper wound cleansing and application of sulfonamide powder. Dr. Cloward recommended "generous use of sulfonamide in scalp, skull and brain wounds because it is absorbed into the blood stream more rapidly than other sulfonamide drugs."

Cloward said that brain wound fatalities should be far below the World War I figure of 28 per cent.

PROBE PROFITS OF CHIP ROBERT

Reveal Firm of Former Democratic Official Got Navy Jobs.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Defense contract activities of L. W. (Chip) Robert, one-time New Deal official and former secretary of the Democratic National Committee, were revealed yesterday insofar as they concerned Navy business. A handsome percentage of profit was showed.

His firm, Robert & Co. Inc., of Atlanta, received nine contracts for engineering and architectural services for Navy projects. The nearest competitor got six.

On six smaller projects his company's fees were \$172,732, the cost to his organization \$136,257, and the profit \$36,475, or 21.12 per cent of the total amount of fees received, and 26.76 per cent of the cost to his organization for services.

Profited on 4 Jobs

On two of these contracts the company lost, the committee computing the losses as 9.35 per cent and 28.93 per cent, the latter on a very small project for which the fee was \$1200. On the four other contracts the committee computed the profit as 28.7 per cent, 36.3 per cent, 53.3 per cent and 56 per cent.

The committee has not received enough data to compute profits or losses of Robert & Co. on the three major projects—at Bermuda, Jacksonville, and Corpus Christi, for which the firm's fees are \$592,850.

Hearing Scheduled

The Naval Affairs Committee has shown such interest in these three projects that it will hold a public hearing to put the details on the record.

Mr. Robert, early in the Roosevelt Administration, was assistant secretary of the treasury in charge of public buildings. He left the Treasury after a row with Secretary of the Interior Ickes. Subsequently he became secretary to the Democratic National Committee. He left his political post after criticism of the number of Naval contracts he was receiving.

LET FARMERS DO FARMING

Government Says City Folk Needn't Spade Lawns For Gardens.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 (U. P.). — At ease, you city farmers! Drop those spading forks. Get away from those seed catalogs.

You want to be patriotic, you want to help beat the Japs, don't you? Well, take the advice of the Department of Agriculture—stick to your petunias, and let the parsnips go unless you've been raising them before.

Let the country's dirt farmers raise the vegetables. They'll do it better and you won't get so many stiff joints.

Don't get the Department of Agriculture wrong. It's not trying to stifle one of the strongest and noblest urges in the heart of man just for the fun of it.

Called a Waste

But it remembers the last war when housewives and their husbands, brokers and mechanics, secretaries and store clerks went hog wild with hoes and spades on every plot of idle ground they could find, including parks, golf courses, lawns and baseball diamonds.

The net result was a great use of seeds, fertilizers, insecticides and energy which might more efficiently have been used on farms by experts at gardening.

So this time the Department hopes that city folk who aren't used to gardening will let their lawns lie fallow and continue to rely on the corner grocery store for swiss chard, carrots, radishes, tomatoes, onions and spinach.

Because food is a weapon in time of war and because they know that the spring madness induced by too close association with an illustrated seed catalog can't really be cured, the Department's experts, as one of them put it today, "aren't condemning anyone who can actually produce food."

"But," he added, "this is no time to waste labor and seed, and we don't believe the average city lot and the average city dweller make the most efficient combination for turning them into food."

Less Cauliflower

Conceivably, if every potential city farmer should dust off his tools, grub out his flowers, turn under his bluegrass and start planting vegetables, a serious shortage might occur in some seeds. Carrot, onion and beet seeds, for example, are not as abundant as usual because of crop failures in the West caused by too much rain last year.

Certain other seeds, such as cauliflower, are not as plentiful as they were before imports from Europe were cut off by the war.

The Department estimates roughly that there are at least as many potential city farmers as genuine dirt farmers, and last year there were 4,431,000 farm gardens in the United States. The Department's aim is to bring the total of farm gardens this year to 5,760,000.

ADD TO LIFEBOAT RATIONS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 (U. P.). —The Bureau of Marine Inspection and Navigation of the Department of Commerce today issued regulations requiring that a wider variety of emergency rations be carried in lifeboats and life rafts of ships whose routes carry them more than 200 miles offshore at anytime.

QUIZ 2 IN \$176,000 FOOD STAMP THEFT

BUFFALO, N. Y., Jan. 22 (U. P.).

—Local police and Federal Bureau of Investigation agents today questioned two men, one under indictment in Detroit, in connection with the robbery of \$176,550 in Federal food stamps there Sunday.

The suspects, along with two women, were seized yesterday. One of the men is wanted in Detroit in connection with a \$64,740 bank robbery in 1936, police said.

Three pistols, a revolver and ammunition, were found in a suitcase in the house where the four were staying.

SERVICE EMPLOYEES' UNION HOLDS RALLY

Members of the Business Service Employees Union, Local 69, will attend a patriotic rally at 2 p. m. Sunday in Castle Hall.

According to Carl G. Berg, president of the local, this is the first patriotic rally of any union labor organization, as such, in Indianapolis.

The color guard of the Frank T. Strayer Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, will present a flag ceremony to open the rally. Special music will be played and Mr. Berg will speak, saying that the employees of public

and private buildings in Indianapolis and Marion County stand "four-square with all America in its determination to win this war."

Special emphasis will be placed on the necessity for guarding against acts of sabotage and of giving the fullest co-operation to properly constituted authorities on civilian defense.

The union is composed of building custodians, janitors and other em-

ployees in school, office and industrial buildings in the city and county. Mr. Berg said that there are between 8000 and 10,000 of these membership.
