League of Women Voters Calls Sessions to Inaugurate Its 'Wartime Service Plan'

A regional meeting of the League of Women Voters will be held tomorrow in Bloomington to discuss methods of carrying the league's new wartime Service Plan into effect. Representatives of the Evansville, Terre Haute, Richmond and Hagerstown Leagues will attend with Indianapolis league members.

Plans for each local league to take back to its own community will be brought before the delegates. The wartime service plan has "committed the league to reaching a larger public than ever in its history, with new methods, special enrollment and instruction of its members, and with a new determination," according to the Declaration of Wartime Service adopted at the National Emergency Council meeting here last month.

The Indiana League of Women Voters, in accordance with this purpose, has "adopted as its wartime service the enlistment of its members to spread understanding of wartime problems of Government," and Mrs. Clarence F. Merrill, state president, has called three regional meetings this week so that plans for carrying the program into effect may be passed on to local leagues throughout the State.

The week of Feb. 1 has been designated as enlistment week in Indiana, when all league members will be asked to volunteer a certain number of hours each week for this community service through the league.

Members will attend training meetings where they will receive information about Governmental problems for distribution by league members in an effort to "spread understanding of wartime problems of Government."

Mrs. Edwards Presides

Mrs. Richard Edwards, Wartime Service Director for Indiana, will preside at the three meetings and other members appearing on the programs include Mrs. Merrill and Miss Irene C. Sweeney, field secretary.

"The league, unlike most organizations, is not only engaged in prosecuting the war itself to a successful conclusion," said Mrs. Edwards in discussing the reasons for calling the regional meetings, "but has the deeper objective, which really underlies the whole war effort, of securing the continuance and strengthening of democratic ideas and the democratic form of Government."

"We are not only concerned in repelling aggression, repairing its inroads, human and material; we are concerned with preserving the type of Government we believe in, through the stress of war activities and against the impacts of those shifts in Governmental emphasis necessary during the war period."

By study and training, this second phase of war activity calls directly for league promotion to ensure understanding of wartime problems, because understanding citizens are the core of a democracy."
