NAVY V-7 RULES  
ARE BROADENEDStudents in Five-Year  
Courses May Enroll  
In Reserves.

Students in Indiana colleges who now are enrolled in five-year courses and eligible for degrees by July 1, 1943, may enlist in Class V-7 of the U. S. Naval Reserve and complete their education before being called up for training.

This was announced today by Lieut. Comm. S. A. Bishop, USNR, Naval liaison and V-7 procurement officer of the Indiana area. Only fourth and fifth-year students in five-year courses will be considered for enlistment, he said, just as juniors and seniors are to be the only students in four-year college courses considered.

No distinction will be made between students attending day or night school in considering candidates for the USNR midshipmen schools. The only requirement in this respect is that an accredited institution give them credit for the class work accomplished.

Two Hoosier aviation cadets have reported for advanced flight training at one of the Naval Air Stations.

They are Joseph M. Zappia of Indianapolis and Earl P. McBride of Bloomington. They were the only Hoosiers among 337 newly appointed aviation cadets to receive the appointment.

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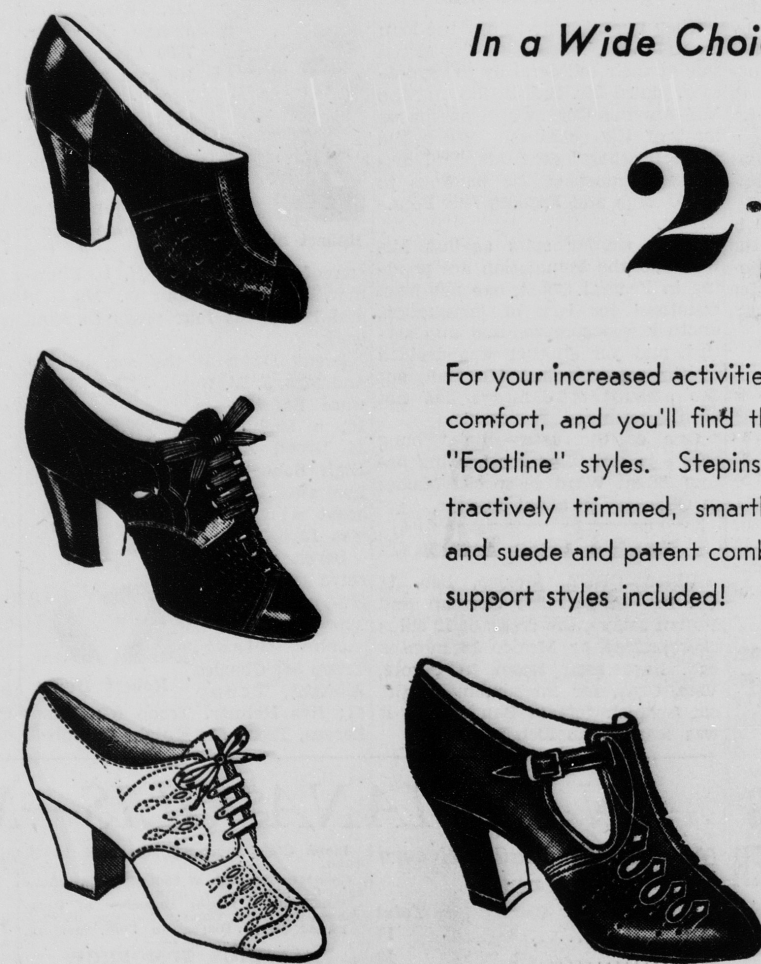
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
