**Censor Won't Tell Next Draft Registration Total**By FRED W. PERKINS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Germans, Japs and others who may be interested will be screened by censorship under present War Department plans, from learning the number of men who register for possible U. S. military service next Monday, in the 20-44 group not previously catalogued.

But any agents of enemy governments who have a yen for the information can approximate it closely down to counties and townships

—by obtaining the easily procurable population and age reports of the U. S. Census Bureau. And a large part of the information is obtainable from such compendiums as the World Almanac.

No official explanation has been given why the War Department ruled on Feb. 8 that the new draft figures will be considered as "restricted information." Officers concerned with the registration merely say, "that's orders."

As a result protests are going to the War Department, with the pos-

sibility that the ruling may be changed. The protests are being made by other governmental agencies and also by citizens concerned with the spread of censorship to fields in which they see no need for it.

If the policy stands, State Selective Service headquarters and local draft boards will not be allowed to give out any statistical information on the number of registrants in their respective areas. The ban also includes figures concerning the national registration.

It may or may not be a violation of the War Department policy to repeat a figure already widely published as the probable new registration—9,500,000 men.
