Japanese Can't Take the Philippines, Says Hoosier Sailor Who's Been There

You can take it from an ex-Navy man that the Japanese have bitten off more than they can chew in their invasion of the Philippines.

Daniel Dennis Sullivan, a husky youth who served a four-year stretch with Uncle Sam's fleet all over the world—and who has the pictures to prove it—compares the Japanese problem with that of the Nazis in France.

"It wouldn't surprise me a bit to start reading in the papers most any day where some high ranking members of the Japanese Army have been assassinated by the Filipinos," he declared.

Praises Natives' Loyalty
"The Filipinos don't want to be controlled by anyone."

Mr. Sullivan praised the loyalty of the island natives, saying that "when the 'Star-Spangled Banner' is played, you will see just as many Filipinos jump up as you will Americans."

"They are very loyal to the United States and the independence of this country was soon to give them

was wanted more by the Government than by the people," he said.

His pictures range from views of important world scenes to horror "shots" of innocent Chinese citizens riddled with Japanese machine gun bullets and left in the city streets for others to look at.

"The hardest picture I tried to take was one of the few I failed to get," Mr. Sullivan said. "While en route home on the U. S. S. Augusta, on which I was stationed, I wanted to shoot a picture of one of the 12-inch disappearing guns that help fortify the island."

"Just the Sky"
"The troops were having target practice and I thought I could snap the picture when the gun reached the peak of its climb and have the weapon recorded on film before it descended. So I aimed the camera, got my focus and waited. I saw the gun come up with lightning speed, saw the flash as it sounded off and then snapped the camera shutter. When the film was developed, there was nothing on it but a beautiful blue sky and an outline of the fortress."

Mr. Sullivan said it wouldn't surprise him if Gen. Douglas MacArthur's valiant forces are able to hold out indefinitely against the overwhelming forces of the Japanese Army.

May Join Navy Again

Mr. Sullivan, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Victor Sullivan, Lawrence, Ind., is seriously thinking about going right back into the Navy. He left Manila in December, 1940 on a homebound-bound cruise just before his discharge.

It was on that cruise that Mr. Sullivan obtained a souvenir of the voyage which he is fairly sure no one else on the boat was able to get.

On a cruise back to home port, the ship always trails behind it the "homeward bound" pennant, a strip of flags 800-900 feet long. During this particular voyage, part of the pennant was lost when it struck the water and while the remainder was being hauled aboard to be repaired, Mr. Sullivan snipped a piece from it.

Flown out once more, the pennant struck the water a second time shortly afterward and was lost.

MIDDIES DUE AT N. D. ON APRIL 15

Naval Reserves to Train for
Month; More Plan Summer
Courses.

NOTRE DAME, Ind., Feb. 13.—The first contingent of naval reserve midshipmen is expected to arrive at Notre Dame University April 15 for a month's training in naval subjects.

Notre Dame officials received word Monday from the U. S. Navy Department that the University campus had been selected as an indoctrination center for midshipmen.

The month's work on the campus will be similar to the work formerly accomplished by a month's cruise.

More than 1900 Notre Dame students have notified University officials that they will take summer courses in order to shorten their college careers because of the war.

FOOD COSTS UP 18% OVER JANUARY, 1941

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (U. P.).—The American housewife paid an average of 2.7 per cent more for food all mid-January than in mid-December, the Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today.

The mid-month statistics showed also that retail food prices for the nation advanced 18.8 per cent over January, 1941.

The average price of sugar in retail stores advanced 3.6 per cent between Dec. 16 and Jan. 13, "largely because only small quantities, usually two pounds, were available in cities where purchases were limited voluntarily by retail grocers."
