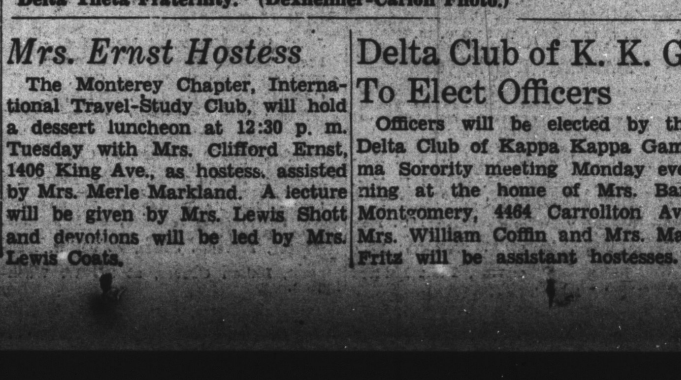
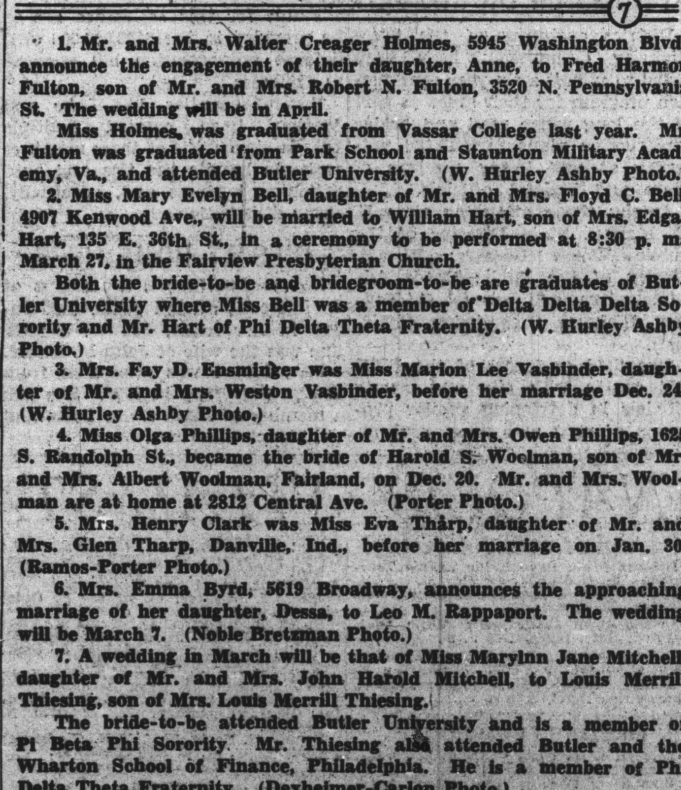
The couple will leave for a short trip to Cincinnati, the bride traveling in a green crepe frock with brown accessories. They will be at home at 1445 N. Delaware.
